Born in a large family of seven brothers and two sisters, Elaine credits her mother Lucille's constant support and advice for her success. She is active, outgoing, and always comfortable being the center of attention.



Elaine graduated from Redlands University with a BS in Business and Administration Management. She worked in communications for almost 42 years but is now retired. Elaine was once a certified personal trainer. She loves to sing while playing her ukulele. Being a high-energy person, Elaine loves to exercise. Her favorite activities are golfing with her brothers, Zumba, and hiking.

To balance her active side, she turns to her creative side and is now a full-time artist. Art, in some fashion, is part of her everyday life and is her favorite form of meditation. As a child, Elaine was inspired by a local artist and had been creating ever since. Elaine loves to draw and paint. She paints in both watercolor and acrylic. 

We are a group who strives to take care of the gourding community while doing our best to promote gourds and gourd art!

#1 CGS President

- Provide leadership for and act as a spokesperson for CGS to carry out the CGS mission statement.
- Serve as a member of the Board of Directors, prepare board meeting agenda, and conduct the annual meeting.
- Maintain communication with Board Members and call for annual reports from each director.
- Monitor society financial status with the treasurer, promote fund raisers, and sign-off on the annual IRS non-profit reports.
- Prepare a quarterly "President's Message" for the Golden Gourd.
- Prepare a quarterly message for The American Gourd Society Magazine.
- Coordinate with the Directors of the Northern and Southern Patches to maintain a CGS presence at major gourd festivals and other events as appropriate.
- Respond to members' concerns and make referrals as needed.
- Respond to inquiries from potential members.
- Serve as a member of the annual Gourd Art Competition Committee.
- Maintain communication with the American Gourd Society and other gourd societies as needed.
- Attend annual AGS meeting if feasible.
- May or may not place insurance coverage for CGS, order renewals and request Certificates of Insurance as needed. (Currently the Secretary does this)
- Is granted a lifetime free annual membership to the CGS upon completion.

#2 Treasurer



- Serve as a member of the Board of Directors.
- Record deposits made by membership chair. Deposit funds from various events.
 - Pay bills as presented by vendors and/or members for reimbursements.
- Record deposits and expenses. Maintain a monthly financial balance.
- Prepare annual reports for the Board meeting.
- Prepare Federal and State annual tax returns. Note: If gross receipts and assets continue to be less than \$50,000, the Form 990/199 is not required. You can send 990-N and 199-N Electronic post cards at IR/FTB website.
- Maintain PayPal and SquareUp accounts for accepting of credit card payments as well as approve CGS members as sales associates for the Square Account.
- File form RRF-1 Registration/Renewal Report with the Department of Justice annually.
- File forms CT-NRP-1 Nonprofit Raffle Registration Form and CT-NRP-2 Nonprofit Raffle Report with the Department of Justice annually.
- File Statement of Information with Secretary of State (biannually).
- Communicate returned checks.
- File sales tax returns annually.
- Respond to correspondence from Franchise Tax Board, Internal Revenue Service, and CA Board of Equalization.
- File forms 1099 yearly. Both state and federal yearly returns are now required.
- Distribute prize checks for annual CGS competition.
- Keep last seven years of tax and financial records.



#3 Director of Southern Regional Groups

- Serve as a member of the Board of Directors.
- Contact each Patch within your territory a minimum of quarterly. Contact may be made in person or via internet or telephone.
- Conduct annual meetings of Patch Leaders.
- Maintain a roster of Patch Leaders.
- Provide each Patch Leader with a "Red" Book of CGS policies and procedures, as well as other written materials to assist them in conducting meetings.
- Attend annual Board meeting and present a status report of the past year's activities.
- Identify and coordinate new Patch leadership.
- Provide training to Patch Leaders.
- Encourage each Patch to participate in fundraisers and other activities of CGS, including fairs, festivals, and competitions.
- Inform CGS President and Vice-Presidents of issues presented to you by Patches.

Olive shared her fantastic large mushrooms and snail. This is how this great class we have coming up started. The class will be these great minis shown above. Love them!



- □ The entry fee per entry is \$6.00 for CGS members and \$10.00 for all others. One entry per entry form. Make checks payable to CGS and put inside your box containing your entry. Please complete the entry form and e-mail back to head clerk. Enclose a copy with your entry piece.
- □ **Mailed entries** will be accepted. Mailed entries must arrive by October 10, 2022. See directions below.
- Entries may be submitted before October 10. 2022. LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE JUDGED. The manual entry form is available on the CGS website: https://www.californiagourdsociety.com/
- For on-line entry form, please use this link: <u>CGS So. Cal Entry Form 2022</u> It will be submitted electronically. When you submit your entry, a copy will be sent to you.
- □ CGS reserves the right to photograph and video each entry and use in promotion of CGS Art Competition.
- □ While every effort is made to provide security of items, the California Gourd Society and Orange County Gourd Society are **not** responsible for damaged or lost items.
- The artist is responsible for placing his or her piece in the correct category.
 Note: We have four divisions. Please read category and division descriptions carefully. Fit your artwork to the categories.
- Packing gourds will be transported from a group pick-up to entry, storage and to show. Please pack your gourd for <u>safe</u> transport and handling. If you have multiple entries or entries with stands, please enclose a picture or diagram.

CGS or its representatives are not responsible for any damage caused during shipping. Insurance coverage is recommended. Please ensure that your gourds are packed carefully with ample protection.

- (1) Take the box to the post office or shipping office you prefer.
- (2) After determining postal cost for one-way shipping, purchase two (2) shipping labels.
- (3) Enclose postage label for return shipping inside the package with your gourds.
- (4) Affix postage for shipping to the competition on the outside of the package.
- (5) Send a text or e-mail with the tracking number to Debra Zimmerman.

General Rules

- 1. Gourds must predominate. Entries must have **a predominate** focus of the medium or technique for the entry category. For example, if entered in Painting, the painting must be the focal point of the piece.
- 2. Gourds previously entered in **a CGS competition** and judged by AGS guidelines will not be permitted.
- 3. Craft/artwork for each entry must be the **original** work of the person who is the entrant. Pieces **cannot** be **collaborations** of two or more artists.
- 4. Only one entry per category is permitted.
- 5. Class gourds are permitted only in the Class Gourd Category.
- 6. The Head Judge reserves the right to disqualify or reassign entries that do not meet category criteria. S/He may also change, subdivide, or combine categories as necessary.
- 7. Copyright designs such as Disney characters or copies of other artist's work may not be used on entries unless written permission is granted by the artist or copyright holder. Copyright free designs may be used.
- 8. All participants agree to allow photographs and videos to be taken of displayed items.
- 9. Not all categories may be included in each division.
- 10. Category definitions may be the same for Novice, Intermediate, Advanced and Master Craftsman, but will be judged according to **Division** level.
- 11. Laser work and fractal burning on gourds will not be judged in the Gourd Competition. If a gourd contains these techniques, that portion of the work will not be considered in the judging.

<u>Judging</u>

The California Gourd Society will coordinate all judging. Judging will follow the American Gourd Society judging guidelines. The overall appearance of the entry, quality of craftsmanship, difficulty and level of effort as well as the use of featured technique/theme will be considered.

Awards

Awards will be given for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each category at the judge's discretion. A category with only one entry does not necessarily guarantee a 1st place. Winners can choose to receive a ribbon or pin for 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place awards.

Best of Show – award given to preferred entry of BOD. Best of Division – One entry out of all Firstplace entries in each division. Judges Choice – award given by each judge to their favorite entry. <u>Special Category – Class Gourds</u> For this competition, we are allowing class gourds in an open division (all levels). Entries in this category are **not** eligible for Best of Show or Best of Division. You may enter a gourd completed in a class. There will be two sections: <u>Section A - Simple class</u> gourds – work completed in class in **one** session. <u>Section B</u> – Complex class gourds – work completed in and out of class or in a multiple day class.

The Price of living off grid!

FALL is almost upon us and thank goodness; I will take the cooler weather any day over hotter. I really have a hard time dealing with oppressive heat, and right now, as I write this, we are at the tail end of the hottest days in California history! We've lived in the Santa Cruz Mountains for 12 years now and this is the first time we hit 110 degrees. (Might as well live in Arizona.)


