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
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

~ Featured Artist ~

Cecile Garrison, Gourd Farmer and Manipulated Gourd Artist, Visalia

Cecile Garrison is a retired Registered Nurse with a green thumb and an obsession with growing and manipulating the Lagenaria Gourd. She bought a package of "Birdhouse" Gourd seeds at Walmart in 1987. She planted them in a six-inch strip of poor soil between a seven-foot fence and a concrete driveway. Her heart was stolen forever when tiny tendrils started climbing rusty nails and splinters to the top and over that seven-foot fence with no formal climbing structure.

She wasn't sure what to do with her huge supply of birdhouse gourds that Fall! So, back to Walmart for craft supplies to produce what else? Birdhouses! But then she took a one-day class "The Art of Decoupage" by Ginger Summit at a local college. This was where she met other "Gourd Addicts" and learned all about "Gourd Festivals!" These festivals opened a whole new world of vendors, tools, supplies, paints & dyes and so much more!

Cecile would not have known about the Jim Story "story" if she had not met Glenn Burkhalter at a Wuertz festival in Casa Grande, Arizona. Glenn and his wife produced an eye-catching number of giraffes with tall skinny necks and little, tiny ears all made from Long Neck Dipper gourds. The necks all had knots manipulated by Glenn. Glenn was full of information on how to manipulate and where to get even more information.

Of course, Cecile had to have one of those giraffes! (See picture) Manipulation became Cecile's new passion after that festival. Cecile is writing an article on manipulating for the next issue of the American Gourd Society magazine.

When she and her husband, Ernie, bought their twenty-acre farm with lots of room and a guest house, it became the perfect place to invite teachers from several states to share their knowledge. Bonnie Gibson taught several classes on their farm and increased comfort with power tools to at least one hundred gourd addicts! Gloria Crane, Kristi Dial, Ron Swank and many more great instructors also came and lit creative fires under new and experienced gourd artists.

Cecile was also president of the American Gourd Society from 2015-2019. As president, she used her platform to introduce new people to gourd art and encourage old-timers to stretch their creative muscle.

Cecile has been a guest speaker at several garden clubs, local schools, the San Francisco Garden Show, and the Tulare Farm Show. Her work has been on display at Arts Visalia, the Arts Consortium, and the Yerba Bueno Center for The Arts.

In the past few years Cecile has entered several manipulated gourd creations in the American Gourd Society magazine contests held quarterly with the goal of encouraging others to grow, manipulate, and create art from the Long Neck Dipper gourd. Cecile states that encouraging others to share the thrill of successfully manipulating a living plant is her favorite pastime!

Note: Please read category and division descriptions carefully. Design your artwork for the category.

General Rules

- 1. Gourds must predominate. 50% of medium or technique to be used on the crafted gourd surface should exhibit the required medium or technique.
- 2. Gourds previously entered in a CGS competition are not permitted.
- 3. Craft/artwork for each entry must be the **original** work of person who is the entrant.
- 4. Only one entry per category is permitted.
- 5. Judges reserve the right to disqualify or reassign entries that do not meet category criteria.
- 6. Copyright designs such as Disney characters or copies of other artist's work may not be used on entries unless written permission is granted by the artist or copyright holder. Copyright free designs may be used.
- 7. All participants agree to allow photographs to be taken of displayed items. Not all categories are included in each division.

Judging

The California Gourd Society will coordinate all judging. Judging will follow the American Gourd Society judging guidelines and use AGS trained judges. Scoring option C (Verbal Consensus) will be used. Points will be given for originality of design, workmanship/craftsmanship, neatness and quality, color/finish, balance/scale, and overall appearance.

Ribbons will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each category at the judge's discretion. A category with only one entry does not necessarily guarantee a 1st place ribbon. Best of Division and Best of Show will be determined by all the judges. The "People's Choice" ribbon will be decided by show visitors.

PLEASE NOTE:

The Categories for Novice and Intermediate Division are "Technique Based." The Categories for the Advanced and Masters Division are "Theme Based."

CATEGORIES FOR NOVICE AND INTERMEDIATE GOURD ARTIST (Technique Based)

- 1. **Pyrography** Burning a design (line or shading) on a gourd with the use of an electric wood-burning tool. Gourds that display fracking will not be accepted for this show because of safety reasons.
- Carving/ Fretwork/Filigree The removal of a portion of the outer surface of the gourd, exposing
 the undersurface to create a design or texture in relief and/or a decorative design (of holes and
 other shapes) cut through the shell of the gourd.
- 3. Painted/ Coloring Techniques Any coloring technique, using stains, dyes, inks, oil pastel pencils, crayons, colored pencils, felt tip pens, acrylic paints, oil paints, watercolors, etc. Weaving/Coiled A gourd woven or coiled using any natural, man-made or artificial fiber. Any technique allowed. You must be able to see part of the gourd. Any finish allowed. The fiber art technique must predominate.
- **4. Mixed Media –** For Novice and Intermediate Division this category must include 2 or more techniques. Any type of finish or embellishments are allowed. For the Advanced or Master Division 3 or more techniques must be used.
- 5. Anything Goes Delight us with your best!

CATEGORIES FOR ADVANCED AND MASTER GOURD ARTIST (Theme Based)

We have no specific category, just theme based. Using any technique and/or medium, WOW the judges with gourds featuring the stated theme. All medium(s) and any technique(s) are allowed for any category. Also, any combination of mediums or techniques may be used.

- 1. Whimsical Create a whimsical piece. You are only limited by your imagination.
- 2. Contemporary— Create a work reflecting artistic work/ideas influenced by modern art.
- 3. California Impressions-Create work that best represents your impressions of California.
- **4. Faux Look-**Create a look unique to specific style of medium. Examples of faux looks are leather, stonework, patina, gold leafing, antiquing, ivory, crackle, beadwork, etc.

Here's a Refresher on Gourd Crafting Terms and Definitions

Accessories or Embellishments Any material added to the crafted gourd to complete the exhibit.

Artificial or Man-made Accessories/Embellishments Any material added to the crafted gourd that is not natural, such as artificial flowers, plastics, plastic eyes, or manufactured items. (See also Natural Accessories.)

Artificial Sinew A waxed nylon imitation of natural sinew (animal tendon) used in beading, sometimes used in place of cotton thread. Artificial sinew will be allowed on all entries.

Base A support or stand that holds a gourd at the proper angle or position. It may be metal, wood or a manufactured turn-table but the base will not be considered an accessory of the crafted gourd.

Basket A gourd with the top cut off with a carrying handle attached or cut so that part of the gourd remains to function as a handle.

Beading The technique of using beads to apply a design to a gourd. Beads may be applied with beeswax, embedded in recessed holes, strung and wrapped around, or sewn to the gourd. Beads are made of plastic, glass, and/or natural material, i.e. shell, wood, clay or seeds.

Bowl A gourd with the top cut off (or some portion cut off) to give the appearance of a container.

Burned Using a Flame (i.e., small torch) to char or change the color of the gourd surface (See also Pyrography/Wood-burning.)

Carved The removal of a portion of the outer surface of the shell of a gourd, exposing the undersurface to create a design or texture in relief, usually done with a power tool.

Chip Carving Carving done with gouging tools to "chip" out small pieces of gourd to create a pattern or design on the surface of the gourd.

Clear Finish Any finish, such as varnish, shellac, wax or oil, which enhances the overall appearance of the gourd but adds no color (except the slight natural darkening that may occur).

Coiled Use of pine needles or grasses, or other materials, wrapped and held in place by thread, raffia or sinew to cover rims of bowls or create designs on gourds.

Color/Coloring Using any medium that adds to, enhances, or changes the natural appearance of the gourd's surface. Some examples of color media are stains, dyes, inks, oil pastel pencils, crayons, colored pencils, felt tip pens, acrylic paints, oil paints, watercolors, colored waxes, etc.

Cut Gourd Cutting all the way through the gourd shell to create a hole or opening (as opposed to surface cuts as in carving). The cut or openings are incorporated into the design.

Embellishment/Accessories Any material that is added to the gourd to enhance the overall design and appearance of the gourd. (See also Artificial Accessories and Natural Accessories.)

Filigree/Fretwork An intricate, interlaced, decorative design (of holes or other shapes) cut into and through the shell of the gourd, usually done with power tools.

Functional An item fashioned to be used. For example, gourd pitcher that actually holds water and has a functional spout and handle.

Medium/Media Material used for artistic expression, such as paint, dye, ink, clay, beads, etc.

Natural Accessories Any material added to the crafted gourd that is natural. Examples include linen/cotton thread, grasses, pine needles, seeds pods, shells, stones, bone, feathers, etc.

Pyrography/Wood-burning Burning a design (lines and shading) on a gourd with the use of an electric wood-burning tool.

Predominate The word "predominate" (when used in Competition Class description to indicate the amount of medium or technique to be used on the crafted gourd) means that the majority of the crafted gourd surface should exhibit the required medium or technique.

Weaving Interlacing various materials attached to the gourd, such as grasses, cords, natural fibers, etc. Weaving techniques include coiling, twining, twill, over/under and Tenerife.

VCGA had a very busy August with the Ventura County Fair, their Annual Picnic, and a long-time member, Charlene, selling all her gourds and such to move out of California.


It's amazing that they had any time to enter their gourds in their county fair's competition, but enter they did and made out well. Photos were taken by Chris Garcia.


I don't know about you but, personally, I find it hard to work in an environment that is cluttered or messy. I'm not saying that it's bad; a lot of you can, and kudos to you! I personally cannot; but I am a messy artist. So, no matter how hard I try and keep things tidy, it never fails that after I finish a piece, my worktable looks like a tornado hit it. I decided enough was enough and I set out to find something that would help me stay organized, starting with my paints. I use different kinds of paint mediums and wanted them all in plain sight. Below is my first "Cool Find".



I went onto ETSY and found these cool paint organizers. There are many different types of these racks and sellers on Etsy, but I chose to go with Malanka Art. These paint rack organizers, originally made for Miniature Paint Sets, can be used for any paint containers, just be sure to check your measurements well. It's easy to assemble and come with good instructions. I glued my stands after assembly so that they were extra sturdy.

As you can see, you can get them with or without drawers. The best part is that they are vertical which leaves more room for my work surface. Because my paints are right in front of me, I now put them back after each use which helps keep my work surface organized. I liked this product so much that I went back and purchased two more units.
