

Featured Artist Profile

Our featured artist for this quarter is **Janice Horner**

Most of us came to be in the gourd world through the back door. Meaning we were not looking for gourds when we found them; in most cases, we searched for something else, which led us to a gourd. I hear this all the time, and I, too, had that same experience. For example, I was looking to re-cane a chair and stumbled upon The Caning Shop. Searching their site led me to colored pine needles, which led me to pine needle rimmed gourds. Others I know have migrated to gourds via their art craft. I know wood carvers who now carve on gourds as a change of pace, pyrography artists who now burn on gourds instead of wood, etc. Our featured artist for this issue is no different.

Janice Horner had not bought a gift in years. She prefers the personal touch and would find things to make. One Christmas, she burned wooden spoons and cutting boards for gifts. So, when she purchased a book on "Wood burning," she was surprised to find in it a burned gourd. That piqued her interest since she was not sure what a gourd was. She then attended the Folsom Gourd Artists Festival in October 2017. "I won a raffle prize of a basket of gourds." By November, she joined Folsom Gourd Artists. She learned about tools used to work on gourds and soon had a collection of tools. "Joining Folsom Gourd artists taught me the most, as we have monthly projects and many talented artists."



made many bracelets, but over time, their elastic rotted. I pulled them apart, separating them by size and color. This multicolored bead feather is made from a people gourd. The black area was carved from wood and covered in resin to create a shadow.

They also have "show 'n tell," where the artist describes how they made their pieces.

The only formal training Janice has had was in Interior Design. She mostly created soft goods for herself and her friends. "I met a lady who contracted herself to a casino where she did the decorating for Holidays and the monthly giveaways. I became her artist and seamstress." That experience gave Janice a better "Artistic Vision." She then took a Bonnie Gibson class and learned more about burrs and design. "I learned from practice and the mistakes I make in the process."

When asked what her preferred mediums are, Janice said, "Acrylics because color adds interest, alcohol inks because the gourd markings stand out, and beading because it's relaxing." Janice also enjoys inlaying onto her gourds. "My shower door broke, and what else was I going to do with the glass pieces? Throwing it out was not an option."

Janice does not feel she has one specific style. She prefers to let the gourd talk to her, then that becomes her style for that gourd; this way, no two are alike. "I enjoy using chards and incorporating them into my design. I like attaching gourds to wood, carving the wood, then using resin to make a cohesive design." I asked Janice what she loves most about working with gourds; she said, "I love the tools; the "whirr-noise" makes me happy because I am creating something. There are so many art designs to be made using gourds, not just decorative bowls. I want to create things that make me happy, fulfill my inspiration and challenge me to create something unique."

I carved and burned this. To add interest, I painted the carved parts red and filled them with resin. The resin adds a beautiful contrast.

"Holy bowl"

This piece reminds me of a poke-a-dot dress I had when I was younger. I carved and sanded all edges for a soft, curved appearance.









This was inspired by my area rug that is cheetah with a zebra border.

The Lamp - The largest gourd I ever carved and burned and painted.

It took 10 days to make this bird. The head and body are one gourd. All bird parts are made from gourds except for the wires in the tail and holding the leaves onto the wings. I burned in the line art, then painted it. I then re-burned the line work. It was like I made this bird twice. The legs, feet and beak are made from Gourd stems.





The wood on this piece was found in my front yard, but we don't have any trees... I polished it up, then decided to land this bird on it.



One of my first pieces. I drew the design, carved it, drew another design, carved that, and so on. The end results remind me of an Aztec design.





These are my first wood burning pieces. We had just returned from Yellowstone, and I had to create these animals. I drew them, then looked at photos to highlight the details on their hide.



"Blue Whale" Rather than make it realistic, I decided to depict the whale swimming through the ocean.

Orange County Gourd Society Update By: Debra Zimmerman

Ocean Drum Class Produces award-winning creativity and soothing sounds.

Orange County Gourd Society artists have been busy drumming up ocean waves following an exciting class taught by fellow member Stacy Holtz. The ocean drum-making lesson spanned two months of patch meetings, starting with cleaning, cutting, and sanding our gourds. Sanding was critical as the drumhead must go on a completely level surface.





Over the next month, we worked on our own, decorating the outside of our drums. Then we worked in pairs to staple or lace the goat skin drumheads in place. In the end, we had 17 finished drums with realistic sounds and beautiful ocean-themed designs. Since then, we've had mini-in-services on using different materials to create texture on gourds, including eggshells, foam clay, and special alcohol dye techniques.

Sharing Art and Knowledge

The April conference in Visalia provided numerous ideas and inspiration for gourding, including gourd mosaic tiles on display. At the patch leaders meeting before the start of the conference, I loved the Ventura group's idea to make Zoom recordings of meetings to include people who can't attend. I hope to start doing that for our patch too. Sharing with others has helped me to learn so much about gourding. I enjoy learning the secrets of the trade from other artists. I recently discovered a great trick from Maggie Le Duc, who was preparing leather trim for her ocean drum. She had a thick piece of leather she wanted to thin so it was easier to apply to the curved edge of her ocean drum. She held the leather to a belt sander, quickly reducing the thickness and making the leather pliable.

Stacy Holtz also shared an idea for displaying how alcohol dyes will look on a gourd. She took a long gourd and divided it into sections. She applied alcohol dye directly on the gourd in one column and then applied alcohol dye over white paint in the next column. The dyes were separated into warm and cool color groups.


Coming Up



CGS at the San Francisco Bay Area Flower and Garden Show

A couple of years ago, just before the pandemic shut down, I received an email from Sherry Larson, the promoter of the San Francisco Bay Flower & Garden Show. Some of you who have been around in 2011 may recall CGS's participation In the Second Annual California State Flower, Food, and Garden Show. What a long name! Anyway, it was the same promoter, show, only in a different location and no food. Well, as it turned out, that show was postponed until April 2022. The promoter was so impressed with our society's popularity at the earlier show she wanted us back.

We were provided a large space, tables, and power to display, demonstrate, sell, and have make-n-take at no cost. CGS was supported by Folsom Gourd Artists, Amador Gourd Artists, Petaluma Gourd Artists, and Calabash Gourd Artists. Jody Dingivan, our Director of Northern Regional Groups, was there all four days keeping continuity going. I greatly appreciated VP Janice Horner's "get in there and do it" attitude. With Janice's lead, we greeted the visitors to our booth, sharing our knowledge about gourds. Many visitors had grown gourds in their yard or knew only about the ones you get at the grocery store around Thanksgiving. There was a lot of interest in how you could take a dirty one from the garden and create beautiful art. Kim Powell, with Amador Gourd Artists, had updated the "History of Gourds" information previously researched by Barbara Rippetoe for the State Fair. It is now on large cardboard trifolds that can be displayed on the back tables. The history also drew the passers-by.



Initially, there were only a few kids to enjoy the make-n-take. The weekend workers found a few more and had the moms and dads joining in too. I think sales were good because our booth was unique to the show. When the visitors got to us, they were happy to see and learn about something new. Most had no idea there was a California Gourd Society. I felt it was a successful venue to get the word out about us.

First step: Transfer your design onto the gourd shard.



Second step: Label your petals, center stamin, and bud from 1 to 6. Layering from back to front, 1 being the first back petal to be made and 5 being the last petal and top layer. 6 being the Poppy Bud.

A Summer Tutorial

"3D QuickWood Poppy Shard"

By Olive Moore

As demonstrated at the 2022 Patch

Supplies: Select a clean square gourd shard.

- 1. Poppy design to transfer onto your gourd.
- 2. Two inches of QuickWood.
- 3. Transparent Acrylic, "Leaf", "Black" and "Nutmeg".
- 4. Q-tips for blending.
- 5. Micro Brushes for applying paint
- 6. Nail Cuticle stick for molding QW.
- 7. Heat Gun.
- 8. (Optional) Dollar Store Shadow box frame, inside painted black with bottom lined in black felt make a nice backdrop for your shard.









Tip: Use a little formula 49 or an acrylic medium and a micro tipped brush to clean up your edges.

Painting Your Shard

Using Transparent Acrylics, paint your leaves with "Leaf", and your stems with "Nutmeg." (see sample below)

Note: You can use any paint you choose for this step, standard acrylics, Ink dyes, etc. Just remember if you use Transparent Acrylics they must be heat set to dry.





Now QuikWood and Petals

~ Divide your 2-inch piece of QW into 4 equal parts. Use the first piece for petals #1 and #2, the second piece is for petal #3 and the #4 stamin, the third piece is for #5 top petal, and the forth piece is for your bud, you have left over QW.

~ Cut the QW with an exac-to blade. Only mix/knead 1/8 at a time keeping the other QW wrapped until ready for the next petal. Blend the two parts of QW thoroughly until it becomes one color (follow QW instructions on worktime)

~ When working with QW hands can become sticky, you may want to use gloves or wash hands before moving onto next petal to avoid buildup on hands.



In numeric order, start with petal #1 working your way to #5 making sure to layer your petals.

TIPS

Lift some of the ends of your petals off the shard to create a 3D effect. Secure your petals by pushing the QW down in the center. This also gives you a nice cup to put the #4 center stamin into.
Mold #5 petal giving it rounded cup look for a more 3D effect.

~ Use your tools to help shape the petals and to add lines and texture to them.

~ If gluing your shard into a shadow box, you may want to raise it up by placing a cut banana gourd piece behind the shard. (See photo)





Painting Your Flower

~ Once your petals are dry, (see drying times on QW directions) you can begin to paint your petals.

~ We used none other than the color "Poppy" from the Transparent Acrylic set to paint our petals and "Black" for the center stamin.

TIPS

 \sim You can highlight your poppy by using a bit of yellow on the higher peaks of your petals and darken the lower valleys of the petals by mixing a drop of nutmeg into your poppy color.

- ~ You can color you background or leave it natural, it's up to you.
- ~ After heat setting your entire piece, us a UV varnish spray to seal it!



Hope you enjoyed this fun and easy project. Thank you for sharing, Olive.

Entries may be submitted in person on Friday August 19 from 10 to 4 pm. Judging will take place at 11350 American Legion Drive, Sutter Creek, CA. 95685

LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE JUDGED.

Judging will take place on Saturday, August 20 at noon. The display will not be open for viewing. Release and pick up of entries will be from 4-5 on Saturday. Mailed entries will be returned the week of August 22^{nd} - 26^{th} .

While every effort is made to provide security of items, the Amador Gourd Artist, the California Gourd Society and the American Legion **are not** responsible for damaged or lost items.

The artist is responsible for placing his or her piece in the correct category.

Note: Please read category and division descriptions carefully. Design your art work for the category.

General Rules

- 1. Gourds must predominate. 50% of medium or technique to be used on the crafted gourd surface should exhibit the required medium or technique.
- 2. Gourds previously entered in a CGS competition are not permitted.
- 3. Craft/artwork for each entry must be the **original** work of person who is the entrant.
- 4. Only one entry per category is permitted.
- 5. Judges reserve the right to disqualify or reassign entries that do not meet category criteria.
- 6. Copyright designs such as Disney characters or copies of other artist's work may not be used on entries unless written permission is granted by the artist or copyright holder. Copyright free designs may be used.
- 7. All participants agree to allow photographs to be taken of displayed items.
- 8. Not all categories are included in each division.

Judging

The California Gourd Society will coordinate all judging. Judging will follow the American Gourd Society judging guidelines and use AGS trained judges. Scoring option C (Verbal Consensus) will be used. Points will be given for originality of design, workmanship/craftsmanship, neatness and quality, color/finish, balance/scale, and overall appearance.

Ribbons will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each category at the judge's discretion. A category with only one entry does not necessarily guarantee a 1st place ribbon. Best of Division and Best of Show will be determined by all the judges. There will be no "People's Choice" ribbon as the competition will be virtual.


