CGS Southern Gourd Competition

2023 Competition Attracts Exceptional Artists, Greatest-ever Number of Entries

The California Gourd Society Southern California Competition hosted by the Orange County Gourd Society on October 21st had a record-setting 111 entries ranging from novel and creative to artistic and highly skilled pieces.

For the first time since the pandemic, the patch hosted a reception for the artists, their families and CGS members to see the show in person. A video of the show will be available soon on the CGS YouTube channel.

JaVae Ferrier, an advanced gourd artist, won the Best of Show for a beautiful piece of gold-leafed gingko leaves mixed with pyrography and decoupaged art paper. JaVae was inspired to start gourding 30 years ago when she saw an article in a magazine that had a plain gourd with simple wood burning. She went on to find an Orange County Gourd Society meeting in a Tandy Leather store then attended a festival at the Welburn Gourd Farm and was hooked. In her artwork, JaVae draws on the Arts and Crafts esthetic, Asian influences and organic materials and colors. JaVae, who rescues greyhounds, also incorporates their portraits into her gourds, along with Salukis and Rhodesian Ridgebacks. Congratulations JaVae!

Other highlights from this year's competition:

- Robin Bryson won Masters Best of Division for her large, impressive piece titled "Warrior,"
 which featured a pyrographed and carved image of a Native American with an arrow through
 the top of the gourd.
- Linda Allen won first place in the Advanced carving category
 for the gourd she created to honor our late friend, teacher,
 and head judge Jack Thorp, who passed away in September.
 Her entry included highly detailed filigree, which was one of
 Jack's special interests. The upcoming YouTube video will
 include an interview with Linda about how she created the piece.

- Evy Eisele won Intermediate Best of Division for a wood-burned and colored sunflower and raven design that was created for a stained-glass challenge.
- Molly Moore, a Novice, won Best of Division for a playfully painted snake, created for a
 "funny looking gourd" patch challenge, which required participants to make something from
 unusually shaped gourds.

The 2023 competition was well-attended, and we would like to thank everyone who assisted with setting up, judging, and taking down, as well as all the artists, who helped make the show a great success. We are looking forward to 2024!



Chris Crady, Folsom Gourd Artist

Chris's interest in Gourd Art started when she saw some gourds a friend made when she took a class through Parks and Recreation. Chris loved the thought of working with gourds so much that her friend taught her what she knew. They then went to Zittle's and picked out some gourds that her friend taught her to clean. At that time, Chris had no tools or gourd dyes, so she used Sharpies and acrylics and made crafty art on the gourds. She heard about a Gourd Festival in Folsom and went. She could not believe how other people used gourds as their art medium. Chris was hooked and wanted to pursue this unique art form further.



One day, she saw a "Woodburning" class offered at Woodcraft in Rancho Cordova. She brought her \$6.00 wood burner to the class and could not burn anything! Then the instructor educated her on professional burners, and she bought a Detail Master on the spot! She now uses a "Razertip". She learned about Leisure Farms in Knights Landing where she bought a few more gourds (she says more like 10)! Chris knew she needed a carving tool, but as it was not in her budget, she did what she could with what she had. Then, on her birthday, her husband surprised her with a "Dremel" carver and flex shaft. Her first carved gourd was a bird painted using furniture stain. That year, Leiser Farms was having a gourd festival, where she met Maria Dellos, who introduced her to Maria's dyes and finishes. The rest is History.

Chris has never had formal art training but has always been a "Crafter." She learned to paint at "Paint and Sip" events and has taken classes with Bonnie Gibson, Vickie Echols, and Joyce Campbell.

Chris's color medium of choice is gourd dyes because they do not dry fast, and with the help of Joyce Campbell, she learned how to make alcohol dyes. She still uses acrylic paints on her gourds when she wants those specific effects and coverage. As a Folsom member, Chris enjoys the "show and tell" portion of the gourd meetings and feels they are essential for new and experienced artists. Like many gourd artists, Chris gets inspiration by trying new things. "I believe that teaching members a project at the club meeting is a very valuable part of the meeting." "The little projects we do in our meetings build a base of skills for artist."

Her style is "Make it as you go"; and says it's maybe not the best way to do art, but most of her gourds start out with plan "A" art drawn on it. Then, as she moves along creating, it may turn into "Plan B". Her favorite thing with gourds is the variety of mediums one can use on a gourd. Not being fond of repetition, Chris says she would be "Out of her gourd" if she had to make 20 of one item.

She liked the name of the Folsom 2021 Festival titled, "Visions of Gourds", and feels it sums up what gourd art is all about. "My vision, My Creation" and thinks there are "No Limits in Gourd Art".

Among Chris many talents, she also has a Cottage Food business where she sells baked goods under the name of "Mama Chris' Treasured Recipes". She sells at farm stands, craft fairs, and from her home. She is also the Web Master for the Folsom Club. Chris and 3 other club members market their art in Roseville at a recently opened store called: "Bliss".





It had two outdoor patios for the classes, a 40' by 50' room for our Raffle and our sellers, and the CGS competition was held in a 10' by 30' room, which was the perfect size.

We secured Joyce Campbell and Kennie Winter for classes. Joyce taught all three days and Kennie on Saturday only. Each class had 6-8 students.



After securing Teachers and Students, the fun began with permits. The city required permits to put up signage. After securing the permits, we had to get the resident's permission to place a sign in their yards leading guests to the clubhouse. So, Marilyn Phelps and I went knocking on doors. We found two very nice people who signed the permits; we had to take pictures of where they would go and submit those to the city for acceptance.

We set up on Friday while Joyce taught her class outside. The setup went well and looks great now; the only question left was, will the public come? Yes, they did. One was from Montana; we had a couple from Nevada and our Calabash group. They drove the distances. We had a constant flow of guests coming through.

Saturday evening, we had a reception for the teachers, students, vendors, and members. A young man walked in with a carved pumpkin, and we invited him to join us and demonstrate pumpkin carving. He and his mother want to join our club.

We secured one new member and have a couple more coming to our next meeting, and we hope they will also sign up.

It was a great festival, and we recouped 45% of our expenditures on cleaned gourd sales, the Raffle (23 baskets), books, and our Critters made by each member of Folsom Gourd Artists.

"Gourds and Baskets Containers of our Culture"


Visalia, California Saturday April 27,2024

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
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
