Second Annual California State Flower, Food and Garden Show

As many of you know, the California Gourd Society was invited to participate in The Second Annual California State Flower, Food and Garden Show held at the California State Fairgrounds in Sacramento April 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th. The Z Gourd Miner's Patch jumped onboard to help support CGS. As it turned out we actually had people from eight different patches volunteering



to help with the show. Along with the Folsom/ Sacramento Z Miners there were CGS members from Amador County, Bachelor Valley Gourd Club of Lake County, El Dorado County Foothill Gourders, Ponderosa Gourd Club of Lower Lake, San Francisco East Bay Gourd Patch and Sutter Butters Gourd Artists. Since this was a Flower Show many people who came by our booth were totally unaware of what a gourd was. We very successfully fulfilled our mission of "promoting the horticulture, crafting, and appreciation of hard shelled gourd". Many people were very interested in our processes and our art.

Members demonstrated various techniques on gourds for four full days. We had six or seven demonstrations going on at any one time. There was carving, wood burning, using alcohol ink, pine needle coiling, wire wrapping on a gourd, beading on a gourd, painting, and demonstrations on how to clean a gourd. WHAT A WONDERFUL GROUP OF VOLUNTEERS. We had an amazing turnout of forty-four volunteers. Everyone was full of energy. We had members sharing all about CGS to the public. We had brochures from different patches throughout the state that we gave to people. I think we probably recruited several new members for various patches. We talked to a LOT of people who had no idea about gourds and were truly fascinated. We were told by another vender that we were the BEST group there. We certainly generated a lot of interest.

Mary and Greg Leiser of Leiser Farms were there with raw gourds and we passed out lots of flyers about upcoming Gourd Festivals.



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

CALL TO ARTISTS

The final Competition at Welburn Gourd Festival will be held at Welburn Farms June 25th and 26th, 2011. It is open to all CGS members throughout the state and beyond. The purpose of the Gourd Art Competition is to challenge CGS members to create new art and develop new ideas for gourd art which fulfills the requirements of a show category. Thousands of visitors attend the exhibit each year and enjoy the creativity and skill of CGS members. *New this near Cash Prince (\$150 for Past of Show)* \$50/*First Plage in each actegory*

year Cash Prizes! \$150 for Best of Show; \$50/First Place in each category and \$100 Best of Division (no cash prize for the People's Choice Award) Th

and \$100 Best of Division (no cash prize for the People's Choice Award). This year will be the last Competition at the Welburn Festival – Let's make it the best one ever! Start working now!

2011 California Gourd Art Competition Rules:

Any individual may enter. All entrants must be current members of the California Gourd Society. Children and youth are also eligible to enter any novice category. Artist entering specific categories in the Master's division may not enter the same category in the Open Division, but may enter other Open Division categories.

GOURDS MUST PREDOMINATE – artistry, originality and integrity of design are considered. Participants many enter any division, only one piece per category.

There are five divisions:

- The *Novice division* is for members who have not previously won a ribbon in a CGS competition.
- The *Open Division* is for anyone who has won a ribbon in the novice division or who does not consider themselves a beginner (honor system).

• The *Master's Division* includes artist who have achieved a level of expertise as demonstrated by having won awards, had work published and/or sold work in galleries.

- The *Children's division* includes anyone 12 years of age or younger.
- The Youth division includes 13-17 year olds.

The entry fee is \$6.00 for each entry. **Make checks payable to CGS**. There is no charge for children and youth. All work must be done by the exhibiting artist and not previously entered in any CGS competition. Advance registration is not taken. When mailing entries, please include a completed entry form for each entry as well as the \$6.00 entry fee and return postage if needed.

Deadline: Mailed entries must be postmarked no later than Monday, June 20th. Mail to CGS c/o Welburn Gourd Farm, 40635 De Luz Road, Fallbrook, CA 92028.

Personal deliveries may be delivered to Welburn only on Thursday June 23rd between 9 am and 4pm.

LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE JUDGED! Entry Form on page 25 and will be at our website in the coming weeks.

Judging will take place on Thursday and Friday, June 23rd and 24th. All participants agree to allow photographs to be taken of displayed items.


Pick-up will be on Sunday, June 26th between 3:00 and 5:00 p.m. Entries may not be removed early. Mailed entries will be returned within two weeks after the show. Mailed entries must have return postage and self addressed shipping container with a label. All art work not picked up or arranged for pre-paid return will be donated to CGS.

Judging: The California Gourd Society will coordinate all judging. Judging will follow the American Gourd Society judging guidelines.

While every effort is made to provide security for your items, the Welburn Gourd Farm and the California Gourd Society are not responsible for damaged or lost items.

This year's meeting began on Friday evening at the home of Betsy Roberts, a venue chock full of inspiration and fun. We had a brief discussion and some brainstorming was done, but most information was reserved for Saturday when all the expected attendees would be present. It was also stressed that CGS membership is required for every patch member, and that it was the patch leader's responsibility to see that ALL of their patch members complied. Snacks were served and a silent auction was introduced so we could all begin bidding on some of Larry McClelland's wonderful Oaxacan art that he bequeathed to CGS. Patch reports were distributed so they could be read before the morning meeting.



On Saturday, the meeting convened after breakfast. Business was discussed, there was more energetic bidding on the silent auction, and the new state project was displayed – a lovely gourd basket full of small decorated gourds. Each patch will take one gourd from a stash to make a bowl or basket, and each of their patch members will be able to make one or many pieces to go inside. Tickets will be sold for a chance to win one. These containers will be on display at the April, 2012 patch leaders meeting in Visalia. The winners will be drawn from all the tickets sold, and a people's choice prize will also be given to the patch receiving the most votes for its container.



Meeting attendees were given a name tag to wear that had their name and either a question or answer. We had to identify the person who corresponded to our name tag and take a bit of time to learn about each other. Then we were given a shadow box and exchanged whatever personal items we had been asked to bring, and were instructed to make a shadow box for the other person. Some people started working on theirs right away, others spent more time in thought and asking more questions, then started. Some embellishments and paints were provided. Lunch was served during this time and the rest of the afternoon was spent with members totally absorbed in creativity.

When all the projects were done, each person stood up and showed the box they had made and told some interesting facts about their partner, explaining why they placed some of the items in the box. This turned

out to be a very emotional time and many people were in tears by the end of the displays. We all got to know each other much more intimately and everyone enjoyed the process, even those who were a bit intimidated by it at the beginning. The boxes were all put on display and there was a vote taken to choose the one that people felt was most touching and informative. Betsy generously put together a lovely basket of supplies for the winner. But as far as I'm concerned, they were ALL winners.

Dinner was served, there was more socializing, and the business was completed on Friday morning after breakfast. The budget, income and expenditures were explained a little more fully and comments and suggestions were encouraged from all present. The overwhelming thought that came from the meeting was that we better understand the role of the California Gourd Society, and that each and every member IS CGS.

CALIFORNIA GOURD SOCIETY Board of Directors Meeting January 8, 2011

The annual meeting of the California Gourd Society Board of Directors was called to order at 9:25am at the home of President Sylvia Nelson in Sacramento, CA.

Secretary's Report: The following motions were made and carried: 1) ratify the gift acceptance policy as approved electronically in June 2010; 2) ratify the bank resolution required to add Sylvia Nelson as a signor; and 3) direct Peggy Blessing to renew

the CGS general liability and the directors and officers insurance policies.

Programs/Regional Groups: The date and location of the 2011 patch leader meeting were confirmed for April 27-29 at Betsy Roberts' home in San Diego. A motion was made and carried to authorize funds for a 2011 patch leader meeting project. The 2012 patch leader meeting will take place April 18-20 in Visalia. Following discussion of a proposed state-wide fund-raising project, it was decided that CGS will purchase a large gourd for each patch and leave it to each of them to decide how to fill their gourd with smaller gourds decorated by their patch members. Raffle tickets will be produced and purchased from CGS at 50¢ and sold for \$1, with 50¢ benefitting the patch. The group discussed how various patches operate as well as the benefits of increasing the use of the Yahoo CGS Rep group site as a tool for patch leaders. Sylvia Nelson reported raffle proceeds for McClelland estate items as a result of her visits to various patches and said Larry's tutorials are now for sale (\$10 each).

Editor's Report: Mary Bliss reviewed the deadlines for the upcoming issues of the *Golden Gourd* [*ref. back page of GG*] and the main items that will be covered in the spring and summer issues. Mary reported advertising income and said Vickie Echols has volunteered to take responsibility for the distribution of coupons. Based on the excellent job Mary performs, combined with the number of hours she devotes to each issue, a motion was made and carried to increase the contract labor amount for production of the *Golden Gourd* from \$500/issue to \$600/issue.

Mary reviewed an analysis of the estimated income loss as a result of the calendar year membership transition. Following discussion regarding the incentive for members to join during the mid-year festivals, a system will be developed so that coupons can be issued on the spot. Upon closer inspection of the bylaws regarding compensation of board members, a motion was made and carried to rescind the January 16, 2010, motion appointing Mary Bliss a Vice President/ Communications/Golden Gourd.

Website Report: Lisa Toth was unable to attend the board meeting. Following discussion regarding methods of website administration, it was decided that a committee be formed to seek bids for a website re-design, the criteria for which will be the use of webbased software so that administration could be performed by a volunteer(s) on a rotating basis from anywhere in the State. A web committee was appointed as follows: Peggy Blessing, Betsy Kritzon, Sylvia Nelson, Diane Pavey-Bentley and Betsy Roberts, and will seek and analyze bids and present the top recommendations to the Board for approval.

Director at Large Report: Greg and Mary Leiser were thanked for their time and resources devoted to the storage, display and sale of Larry McClelland estate items on behalf of CGS, and they reported sales of over \$600. Greg reported on the 2010 festival at their farm, results of the fund-raiser for the Knights Landing library and well as the Robbins school student competition.

Following a lunch recess, Christina Chrivia, JoAnn Clark and Sherry Hunga-Moore joined meeting via Skype video conference.

Treasurer's Report: The group reviewed the 2010 financial statements, which reflected gross profit of \$25,220 and expenses of \$12,117. The majority of net income represented proceeds from the Larry McClelland estate. Betsy Roberts and Jill Walker were asked to provide to Christina Chrivia the differences between the values and sale prices of the McClelland estate items. A CD rate sheet will be sent to the Board, and discussion took place regarding the status of the credit card service.

Membership Report: JoAnn Clark reported membership totals of 386 as of 12/31/10, compared to 468 members at the end of 2009. She reviewed some of the issues and confusion surrounding the calendar-year transition. Discussion followed regarding the enforcement of the requirement that all patch members be members of CGS and the answer to the question "What does my CGS membership do for me?" It was noted that CGS will cover costs for the patch leader meeting and will pay for part of the state-wide fund raising project. A motion was made and carried to award honorary lifetime membership to all past CGS Presidents in recognition of their efforts on behalf of the organization and their value as a resource to the organization. A motion was made and carried to award each gourd patch one free CGS membership, with the requirement that 100% of patch members be current CGS members, and to allow the patch to decide how to use this incentive.

New Business:

<u>Competition at Gourdstock:</u> Sherry Hunga-Moore presented a proposal to consider holding a CGS competition in conjunction with Gourdstock 2012 and reviewed the benefits to CGS. The group reviewed and discussed the cost estimated at \$2,000, the decline of entries at the Welburn competitions, and the fact that for many years CGS had held only one annual competition. Sherry was congratulated on the success of their first event and thanked for the opportunity she has presented CGS. The proposal will be taken under consideration in the development of the 2012 budget.

The web conference with Christina Chrivia, JoAnn Clark and Sherry Hunga-Moore ended.

Old Business:

<u>History Project:</u> Peggy Blessing reported having obtained and organized electronic files and photos she received from Carol Rookstool. A PDF of the Bylaws will be posted on the Yahoo rep group site.

Larry McClelland Estate: Jill Walker reported the status of the Oaxacan art proceeds and inventory. Betsy Roberts explained the research that she and Jill performed in order to value these estate items. Following discussion regarding variety of ways to dispose of these items as quickly as possible, a motion was made and carried to authorize Jill and Betsy to validate prices of the Oaxacan estate items and to lower the price if necessary. It was noted that the Folsom Z-Miners patch volunteered to manage the sale of McClelland collectable and household items at an upcoming community estate sale.

Following consideration of ideas to use proceeds from the McClelland estate that would honor Larry's memory and benefit a broad range of members, a motion was made and carried to award cash prizes sponsored by the estate of Larry McClelland at the 2011 CGS competitions at the Leiser festival and the Welburn festival. Prizes will be as follows: \$150 for Best of Show; \$50/First Place in each category and \$100 Best of Division (no cash prize for the People's Choice Award). The estimated cost was \$1,650 for the competition at Leiser's and \$3,500 at the Welburn competition.

<u>Café Express</u>: Mary Bliss was asked to add additional choices such as aprons, notepads, cups, mouse pads, using the CGS State of California artwork to the Café Express product purchase website which could be used by the patches for fund raisers.

New Membership Card: Following discussion, it was agreed to keep the current format of the membership card/coupon sheet.

Judges and Awards: It was noted that CGS Special Merit ribbons available for use by patches at local county fairs.

New Business (continued):

<u>California State Flower, Food and Garden Show:</u> Sylvia Nelson described the opportunity presented to CGS in connection with a flower, food and garden show occurring this year.

<u>Future Meetings:</u> A motion was made and carried to hold two CGS board meetings a year (September 9 & 10, 2011, and January 14 & 15, 2012). Following discussion, it was agreed that Skype would work for the purpose of giving short reports or discussing one or two urgent matters but could not outweigh the many benefits of attending meetings in person.

<u>President's Travel Expenses:</u> It was agreed that, if the President was unable to attend the American Gourd Society annual meeting, someone on the CGS board should attend in their place and a travel allowance be offered. The importance of the President's attendance at patch meetings, the Wurtz festival and other events of this nature was noted. Sylvia was encouraged to use the President's discretionary spending authority (up to \$500/year) to cover travel expenses.

<u>Vice President:</u> Sylvia said she intends to recruit a First Vice President to help begin the mentoring process for that person to be the next President.

The meeting at 6:40pm.

Note: During the morning of Sunday, January 9, 2011, a draft 2011 budget was developed which will be reviewed by the Treasurer before final adoption.
