FEATURED ARTIST - CONNIE MYGATT

Twenty-two years ago my husband, five children and I moved from snow laden Pennsylvania to sunny Southern California. Twenty years later, the rolling vinevard covered hills of Sonoma county, plus two daughters and 6 of our 13 grandchildren beckoned us from our smog circled existence. What a delight to look out the window and see forever!

While living in Southern California, I loved attending art fairs. At one fair I stopped at a display of intriguing round shapes, stained in earthy tones and embellished with natural materials. The artist, Betz Saltman, informed me that they were gourds. She also said she was giving a workshop the following weekend. It didn't take me two seconds to sign up and begin a wonderful creative journey into the world of gourd art.




Having a degree in art with an emphasis in portrait and the human figure, I found the gourd a wonderful surface on which to draw faces. My favorite gourds to create are what I call the "Wise Ones. I use miniature bottle or large martin house shaped gourds on which I paint Indian faces and paint a robe around the body. I also like to embellish gourds with beads and weave the edge of open gourds with natural materials.

Becoming a CGS regional coordinator has led me to some of the nicest people I have ever met. The openness, trust, enthusiasm, talent, and joy they exude is contagious and a pure gift. The gourd itself has magical qualities, at least I have come to believe that. No matter how I feel if I pick up a gourd and put my energy into the creative process, I feel a sense of peace, enhanced creativity, and a feeling of being one with the gourd. A real Zen moment as some would describe it.

I have been fortunate to have my gourds in various galleries, museums, and art fairs. Right now they are in Christine of Santa Fe Gallery in Santa Fe, and in the Lee Youngman Gallery in Calistoga. S

FEATURED ARTIST - DON WEEKE

My evolution as a gourd maker began with basketry. In 1978, I began taking natural basketry classes from Misti Washington.

In her classes I learned the basic basketry techniques and with her encouragement began to explore new directions, especially with forms and combining different materials. A few years after that class, I discovered gourds. It was while I was exploring a stream bed collecting willow when I saw a whole field of wonderful natural forms-better forms than I could possibly achieve through basketry alone. Combining gourds with basket materials seemed to be the perfect match.

I began with first coiling and couching natural materials on gourds. A class on woodburning and dyes opened new doors, and even more doors were opened with a class that used coiling, netting and clay effigies on gourds. The possibilities seemed unlimited. I continue to find ways to combine basketry techniques with gourds, and ways to piece together multiple gourds to create sculptural forms and masks. I also began carving gourds, first with wood carving tools, but later discovered that a Dremel tool gave me better control.

In 1986 I was asked to teach a gourd basketry class at a basketry conference in Telluride Colorado. That experience was so great that I continue to teach today. My hope is to convey to my students the two basic tenets learned from Misti: (1) there is no such thing as failure and, (2) always give yourself permission to explore. I feel incredibly fortunate to have discovered gourds. It has introduced me to many generous and inspiring people, and has afforded many unexpected opportunities. I look forward to further exploring gourd possibilities and to meeting more wonderful gourd people. S

Fallbrook

The first meeting of the Fallbrook gourd patch was held at the Welburn Gourd Farm in February. Mary Nusum showed the group several of her diverse and clever gourd birdhouse creations and shared ideas on the use of stains for color and for the use of items from nature in decoration. Members also shared their experience in repairing gourds and the use of repair materials. This was a most useful discussion. It's always good to know not only HOW to make a repair, but WHERE to find the necessary materials.

We also talked about the upcoming Welburn Gourd Festival in June and activities that will involve our membership. This festival is probably the highlight of our year and most members like to share in the excitement of the weekend which offers booths of wonderful gourds, entertainment, food, classes, and new ideas.

Our March 26th meeting was our best attended meeting so far! There were 21 in attendance. Kimo Trueman brought tools he uses to craft his beautiful and unique gourds. He explained which were best for each special task. Our gourders had dozens of questions about choosing which tool for their own uses. We needed a session like this, where members could find help deciding which instruments to purchase or to use in a different way. What a wonderful opportunity for us to have the direction of such a genial and patient adviser as Kimo.

Our next meeting will be May 6, again at the Welburn Gourd Farm. 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

We all agreed that the mini-torch has possibilities, but you have to be really careful not to set your whole gourd on fire! It would be advisable to keep a glass of water handy when you're using it and be sure to work on a fire proof surface.

During the month of April several of our members including Kris Mangliers, Liza Muhly, Eileen Marcotte, Jill Walker and Mary Simmons will have their work featured in a show at Gourd Patch Happenin's

the Elemental Arts Gallery in Los Gatos, CA. This show is scheduled to coincide with the Conference of Northern California Handweavers. Many of the gourds will incorporate basketry and weaving in their designs.

Our next gourd patch meeting will be brief (10:00—10:30) and held in conjunction with a class. On Saturday, May 10th, we are hosting a class by gourd artist, Don Weeke. REDUCE, REUSE AND RECYCLE

Having taught the foregoing 5th grade curriculum for so long that it is permanently etched in my brain, I have been keeping every scrap of gourd that has crossed my worktable—tops of gourds from which I had made bowls and ipu's, shards, etc. I had no clue what to use them for, yet I kept on collecting, watching them multiply into Mount Olympus. Then, one night at 3:00 am, Zeus had sent his thunderbolt. The gourd tops had come to life for me. I was up and working with them.

I soon discovered that the top 3 inches or higher made great holders, depending on their height, for crayons, pencils, pens, silverware, remote controllers, etc. Just cut off the stem end (preferably with a band saw) to level it—not too much or you'll make a hole. Should that happen, just fill it with some gourd putty.

If your newly created gourd utensil holder is unsteady or top heavy when filled, here are two simple ways I use to stabilize it: (1) putting about 1/2 inch of plaster, fixall,etc. to the bottom for weight, and/or (2) gluing a wooden shower curtain ring (cheap, at Walmart) to the bottom of your gourd holder too widen the base. Using a wooden ring allows you to stain it to match the gourd. If there are a few small gaps in a few places between the ring and gourd, you can fill them with gourd putty. You are now ready to decorate and seal your holder. Lastly, to give your gourd holder that professional look, glue on a piece of felt either on the bottom to protect table surfaces.

Tops of gourds which are not tall enough for pencil holders can be used for paperclips, pins, buttons, Q-tips, whatever your imagination can come up with. You may consider using tops of gourds for making bases for your other gourd art that needs leveling themselves. Slice the top like a thick slab of Texas toast (again a band saw tends to work best). Play with the thickness of the slices and their diameters to get that perfect match. Glue in place with your favorite gourd glue, adding gourd putty if needed to fill in gaps.

If you do not have a gourd putty recipe, here is mine for you to try. I save the gourd dust created when I sand the inside of gourds and store it in a jar. When I need putty, I mix some of the gourd dust with Elmer's Wood glue until I get a putty consistency. I apply it where needed like any putty. After it dries I apply a light coat of sanding sealer so that it will take a stain or paint to match the gourd itself.

Competition Rules:

- Any individual may enter, but must be a member of the California Gourd Society.
- Participants may enter only one entry per category and in only one division.
- There will be 2 divisions this year: The Beginning division for the novice and Advanced Division for anyone that has won a ribbon in CGS past competitions.
- Entry fee will be \$5.00 for each competition category entered.
- All work must be done by the exhibiting artist and not have been previously entered into a CGS competition.
- Deadlines: Entries that are mailed in must be postmarked no later than Monday, June 19, 2000. If personally delivered no later than Saturday June 24 at 8:00 am.
- Judging will be Saturday June 24th at 11:00 am.
- All participants agree to allow photographs to be taken of displayed items.
- Pick up will be Sunday June 25th from 3:00 to 5:00 pm. Entries may not be removed any earlier.
- Mailed entries will be returned in approximately two weeks after the show. <u>Mailed entries must have re</u>turn postage and shipping container to be returned.
- All artwork not picked up at the end of the exhibit on Sunday June 25th will be donated to CGS.
- California Gourd Society will officiate at all judging.
- Ribbons will be awarded for First, Second & Third place in each category with a cash award for each winner. There will be a Best of show Ribbon and cash award in both divisions. Judges reserve the right to award any Honorable Mention ribbons.

Categories: Gourd must be predominate

- 1. Pyrography: whole or cut gourd. Woodburned only natural or clear finish allowed.
- 2. <u>Carving/Cutting</u>: Whole or cut gourd. Cutting and or carving should be featured. May use carving tools, dremel, saws, etc. Gourd may be colored in any medium.
- 3. <u>Painting/Stained:</u> whole or cut gourd. The use of color(s) any paint, stain, dye, pigment, wax or color medium allowed.
- <u>Multiple Embellishment container</u>: Must be a cut gourd with a lid using tow or more of any techniques including paper-mache, decoupage, color, pyrography, metal, carving, weaving, etc. May be finished in any media and must have embellishments.
- 5. Functional Items: Whole or cut gourd any media. Must be both decorated and functional ready to use.
- 6. <u>Dolls and Figures:</u> Single or multiple gourds may be used. Doll may be applied onto a whole gourd surface by pyrography, paint, clay or a combination of these techniques. Small amounts of additional materials will be allowed.
- 7. <u>Masks</u>: Whole or cut gourd(s). May use any media. Embellishments like feathers, sticks, etc. are allowed. Must have hanger or attachment to allow the mask to be displayed on the wall.
- 8. <u>Jewelry:</u> Whole or cut gourd & or pieces. Any technique is allowed with any medium. May use additional materials to finish embellishing.
- 9. <u>Musical Instruments</u>: Whole or cut gourd(s). May use any media with additional materials to make the piece make music. Judges must be able to play the instrument.
- 10. Weaving/Coiling:
 cut gourd with any technique of weaving or coiling. May use any natural fibers or waxed linen etc. for your stitching.

CRAZY ABOUT GOURDS...MEET KERN ACKERMAN

This man is serious about gourd seeds!!! Kern Ackerman, however, is light-hearted about everything else in life...except possibly making specialty wines (potato, cranberry). A member of the American Gourd Society and the Ohio chapter, Mr. Ackerman is an expert on award winning true gourd seeds. You may pour over the seed catalogs each spring or save your own seeds, but Kern has seeds to dream about!

Hard shelled varieties include Extra Long, Long, and Short Handle Dippers, Big Ball Short Handle Dipper, Apache Dipper, Indonesian Bottle, Small and Miniature Chinese Bottle, Club, Penguin, Goose, Cannonball, Hardshell Warty, Martin House, Banana, Small Lump in Neck, Maranka, Penis

Shield, Big Apple, Snake, Long Gourd, Basketball and various mixed packages. Ornamental seeds are available for Egg. Short Handle Spoon, Flat Striped, Orange Ball, White Ball, White Pear, Spoon, Miniature Warty, Crown of Thorns, and Ornamental Mix.

Kern also has some varieties that haven't yet been grown for the required three years to be classified as true. They have been true for one or two seasons. African Wine Kettle, Small Bushel, Chinese Bottle, and Giant Martin House are varieties currently being tested. The adventurous gardener may want to give some of these experimental varieties a try.

Doing business as "Rocky Ford Gourd Company". Kern has also published a "Gourd Identification Chart" in either poster size or in a 9x11" four page booklet. The cost is \$4 and you will not be able to resist ordering seeds from this publication. All Kern's gourds are grown in isolation or pollinated with germination tested 80% or better.

Ordering is easy. All packages contain 12 seeds except African Wine Kettle which contain 6 seeds. Small orders are shipped in bubble packs. Larger orders shipped by Priority Mail or United Parcel. Each packet is \$2.50 postpaid including shipping and handling. There are quantity discounts for orders over 100 dozen-and that, dear reader will grow a LOT of gourds!

Mr. Ackerman counts dozens of other seed specialists among his friends and acquaintances. There is a sense of competition, vet a spirit of camaraderie when serious gourd growers spend time together. Many hours are spent in discussion of growing techniques and new gourd varieties. For example, California's own Suzanne Ashworth's seed business is located at 5007 Del Rio Rd., Sacramento, CA 95822. Like Kern, everyone wants the gourd garden to be spectacular.
