Gourd Artist Duane Teeter Passes Away

Friend and teacher, Duane Teeter passed away February 13, 2003. His knowledge and genuine LOVE for gourds was great inspiration to all. Duane's contribution of fine art and unselfish instruction helped make the gourd world what it is today. His legacforever remembered, will always breathe its passion into the souls of countless artists and friends privileged enough to know him.

I first got started with gourds when I was referred to the Zittel Farms while I was visiting my mother in the Bay Area. So, I borrowed mom's car and drove up to the farm in Folsom. There I met the owner of the farm and it just happened that Duane was there that day to give a class; only one person had showed and it was about time for him to leave for the day — however, Duane offered to give me the rundown on gourd burning and proceeded to spend the next 2 1/2 hours with me. I never had more fun! Duane was a very giving soul; He was patient and inspiring and ever so kind. It was the time that Duane gave to me that one special day at Zittel Farm that inspired me to fill up my mom's car with gourds, both inside the car and in the trunk. I was thankful that mom didn't go to the farm with me that day...Lord knows, I had NO room for anything else but gourds. I am now a very BUSY gourd artist here in the Great Northwest of Washington state. I love working with gourds and I'll always remember the day that Duane Teeter took the time to spend with a long distance vistor who knew nothing about gourds when she drove up to that farm, yet walked away with a wealth of knowledge and spirit for that art, having been given to her by this wonderful man named Duane Teeter. 

Gourds in the Huichol Style



Near Puerto Vallarta, in west Central Mexico, live the Huichol Indians, an indigenous people best known for their beautiful beaded ceremonial bowls. They have no written language, but called themselves by a local word meaning "healer". This word has been corrupted to the present day word Huichol, pronounced "wetchol" or sometimes "weechol". They live in desolate, inaccessible areas of the states of Jalisco and Nayarit, in "ranchos", scattered settlements.



The Huichol are a deeply spiritual people whose beliefs include wolves that speak to them, rain-bearing snakes, and jaguars that bring messages from God. One fourth of the men are shaman, or healers, who use hallucinogenic peyote to bring enlightenment and visions of color or shape to transfer to their beaded bowls or yarn drawings. The beaded ceremonial bowls are called "rakure" in Huichol or "jicara" in Spanish.

When jicara were first evolved, they were decorated with colorful bits of shell, bone, clay, turquoise, coral, etc. In later years, as today, they began to use glass seed beads in many colors.



The sticky mixture pressed into the bowl is a specific formula of pine pitch and beeswax (without the pitch, you couldn't soften the wax enough to use it). It remains very tacky long enough to do the design.

Before beginning your gourd jicara, you need to have a design in mind. Drawing one in color or using a bead grid are good ways to begin. Then obtain beads in the colors you require. Next, a gourd bowl is coated inside with a thin layer of the melted beeswax and pine pitch mixture (or the wax mixture is kneaded and warmed in the hands until pliable enough to smear inside the bowl- my preferred method). The thickness of the wax layer should not exceed about 2/3's of the depth of your beads. Once the bowl interior is completely coated, your basic design can be scratched onto the surface of the wax. Then the beads are added, hole side showing. Usually beginning from the center bottom of the bowl (depending on the intended design), beads are pressed into the sticky beeswax - only about halfway or 2/3's-way into the wax. Layer the beads in a circle, nestling each row into the one before, overlapping.

With size 10 or 11 beads, you'll probably have a six-sided pattern forming. It depends on how many beads you use to go around the first bead! You can force your design to be six-sided by limiting your second row of beads to only six. Most of the bowls I've seen are six-sided designs or are completely freehand. Like all artwork, ceremonial bowl designs can vary greatly, both in design and color.

As you keep adding beads, beginners may occasionally have small gaps where the spacing isn't perfect. You can solve this one of two ways: place a bead in sideways wherever a space is too small, or spread nearby beads to help cover the gap (best solution for symmetrical designs). Practice will gain you smoother beading techniques.

Handy optional tools to have nearby:

- (1) sharp fine point tweezers or curved point tweezers
- (2) a sharp pointed awl whose point will go into the hole of a bead far enough so you can pick it up
- (3) stylus with medium ball end to press beads into the wax evenly
- (4) wooden clay-working tools with smooth spoon-like ends for spreading the beeswax mixture
- (5) bead tray with multiple indentations for bead colors
- (6) old terry washcloth or cotton dishtowel devoted to wiping bees-wax from your fingertips as you work
- (7) large reclosable plastic bag to keep your bowl in while you're working so it will not dry out too quickly
- (8) heat embossing gun for softening beeswax (meant for rubber stamping)

When your bowl is finished and the beads either end just below the rim or continue over the lip of your bowl, leave it in the open to dry. If the beeswax shows excessively between and on your beads, a heating gun can be used to soften the wax slightly so that it flows back down into the beads. Do this only after finished and be careful not to overheat your beeswax mixture.

Always display your bowl away from heat or sunlight.

Judging Gourd Art

CGS was honored to host Olga Hammer as a featured speaker at our first Asilomar conference. With the competition coming up in June we thought it was a good time to share excerpts from her talk with our membership. Included are those points that will be key to our process in judging this year's competition.

"The primary decision a judge must make is simply whether the object to be judged does or does not meet the rules for the category."

When an entry is placed in the wrong category, judges will disqualify it from the submitted category and place it in a section "for display". In this section the maximum award available is a "Judges Award".

"Integrity, as it is used in this context, refers to the fact that CGS is the host society and the gourds submitted are the items which are to be judged. Therefore, in all items — even the most casual and quick viewing — that which is done to the gourd must enhance the gourd (its gourdishness, if you will). A gourd should not become just a canvas for a painting — however magnificent — that has no real connection to the gourd itself; so the artist must have a true goal in mind, one which respects the gourd and which best fulfills the criteria and rules as designated."

Denise will have several new pieces of gourd art, and will be showing a collection of new oil paintings as well.



CGS 2003 Gourd Art Competition

June 21 and 22, 2003

Beginner and Advanced Artists¹ in the following categories:

- Category 1: Pyrography Whole or cut gourd. Woodburned only. Natural or clear finish allowed.
- Category 2: Carving/Cutting Whole or cut gourd. Cutting and/or carving must be featured. Gourd may be colored in any medium.
- Category 3: Painting Whole or cut gourd. Please indicate type of paint used.
- Category 4: Staining Whole or cut gourd. Woodburning allowed. Staining must be featured.
- Category 5: Inlay Whole or cut gourd featuring inlay. Any items may be inlayed. Woodburning or coloring is allowed.
- Category 6: Pen and Ink Whole or cut gourd. Only pen and ink may be used. Clear finish allowed.
- Category 7: Weaving Whole or cut gourd. Natural or synthetic materials allowed. Gourd may be colored.
- Category 8: Dolls and Human Figures Single or multiple gourds may be used.
- Category 9: Animal Figures Single or multiple gourds may be used. Gourds must predominate.
- Category 10. Insects Whole or cut gourds. Sculptural. Three dimensional only.
- Category 11. Birds Whole or cut gourds. Any media.
- Category 12: Masks Whole or cut gourds. Any media. Embellishments allowed.

 Must have hanger or attachment to allow the mask to be displayed on a wall.
- Category 13: Jewelry Whole or cut gourds or pieces. Any technique. May use additional materials.
- Category 14. Musical Instruments Whole or cut gourd. Must be playable.
- Category 15: Useful Object No restrictions. Gourds must predominate.
- Category 16: Whimsey No restrictions.
- Category 17: This Year's Art Challenge COLOR

This category is a challenge to use the design element of "color." Use your imagination!

- Category 18: Patriotic U.S. No restrictions.
- Category 19: California Theme Create a symbol of California. No restrictions.
- Category 20: Heritage categories (5 categories this year)

Using a single gourd (cut or whole) create a representation of one of these great gourd cultures:

- A African
- B Polynesian
- C Chinese
- D Mexican
- E Native American

Children (12 and under) or Youth (13 to 18) There is no entry fee for children and youth.

Note: Categories 18, 19 and 20 will also be eligible for exhibition at **CGS Gourd Fair LA 2003** "*Bridging Cultures*" on October 11 and 12, 2003 at the Los Angeles County Botanic Garden in Arcadia, 301 N. Baldwin Ave., Arcadia, CA 91007 (Formerly the Arboretum).

Competition Rules - Gourds must Predominate!

- Entrants must be a member of the California Gourd Society. One entry per category.
- Entry fee is \$6. per entry. Children and Youth free. Checks payable to CGS.
- All work must be done by the exhibiting artist and not previously entered in a CGS competition.
- The California Gourd Society will officiate at all judging on Saturday, June 21 beginning at 8:00 am. The show will be open to the public at 11:00 am. Photographing of entries is permitted.

Deadlines: Mailed entries must be received no later than June 17. Personal deliveries no later than noon on Friday, June 20. Deadlines are firm so volunteers can mount the display in advance of judging. Pick-up time will be Sunday, June 22 between 3:30 and 5:00 pm. Mailed entries will be returned approximately two weeks after the show. Mailed entries must have return postage and self-addressed shipping container. All art work not claimed or prepaid return will be donated to CGS.

Please leave your name off any gourd that you enter. Often the judges need to look at the whole entry — having a name on the bottom of the piece can influence fairness.

Be sure your entry fits in the category you enter. When an entry is placed in the wrong category we have to disqualify it. **READ THE CATEGORY CAREFULLY PLEASE**


