
CGS Mini Gourd Mask Fundraiser

Native American uses for the gourd

The Cherokee's used the seeds of the bottle gourd by soaking the seeds to make a poultice used to treat boils.

The Seminole used the seeds for adult's sickness caused by adultery; i.e. headaches, body pains and crossed fingers!

The Seminole also used to burn the seeds to smoke the body for insanity – (it didn't mention whether or not this was done before or after the adultery sickness treatments).

The Hopi used gourds as prayer sticks. They were covered with cord netting, used as water containers in ceremonies and buried with the dead. The Hopi also used gourds as sacred containers for special honey, seeds, cups, and medicine bottles.

The Ojibwa used the gourd as a vegetable, eating the gourd when it was young before the rind had hardened.

The Acoma and Laguna Indians among others used the gourd as a cooking tool. They also used them as containers for water when traveling by foot or horseback.

The Indians of Louisiana made a poultice of the leaves of the gourd plant which were applied to the forehead for headaches...

The Creek Indians in America used gourds for centuries as Purple Martin Bird houses as well as for storing and protecting their corn from animals. The Purple Martin Bird eats insects and captures them in flight. The Creek Indians realized this and for centuries they grew large kettle shaped gourds for the purpose of housing Purple Martins for insect control. As a result, many wild Purple Martins are already accustomed to using gourds for nesting, so much so that there are companies producing **plastic** Purple Martin house gourds in hopes that the birds won't be able to distinguish the plastic look-a-like and the real thing





Call for Artist!

Our Annual Gourd Art Competition and Exhibit

Takes place at the 13th Annual International Gourd Art Festival on Saturday and Sunday, **June 27th and 28th, 2009** at the Welburn Gourd Farm in Fallbrook, California.

The intent of the Gourd Art Competition is to encourage artists to meet the challenge of creating a gourd piece which fulfils the requirements of a show category.

Thousands of visitors attend the exhibit each year and enjoy the creativity and skill of CGS members.

2009 California Gourd Art Competition Rules:

- Any individual may enter. All entrants must be current members of the California Gourd Society.
- GOURDS MUST PREDOMINATE artistry, originality and integrity of design are considered.
- Participants may enter only one piece per category.

There are six divisions:

- 1. **The Novice division** is for members who have not previously won a ribbon in the CGS competition.
- 2. **The Open division** is for anyone who has won a ribbon in the novice division or who do not consider themselves a beginner (honor system).
- 3. **The Masters division** this division includes artists who have achieved a level of expertise as demonstrated by having won awards, had work published or sold work in galleries. Artists entering in this division my not submit entries in the Novice or Open divisions.
- 4. The Children Division—12 years old and Under
- 5. **The Youth Division** ages 13-17
- 6. **The Jim Story Award 2009 Division** This division is open to gourd growers at all levels. This division has been named in memory and honor of Jim Story, master gourd manipulator. The winner of this division will be eligible to compete for the American Gourd Society Jim Story Award which includes a monetary prize.
- The entry fee is \$6.00 for each entry. **Make checks payable to CGS**, There is no charge for children & youth.
- All work must be original and be done by the exhibiting artist and not previously entered in any CGS competition.
- Advanced registration is NOT taken. When mailing entries, please include a completed form for each entry as well as the \$6.00 entry fee and return postage if needed. Entry and Membership Forms are on page 15 of this issue, for additional forms visit our website: www.calgourd.com

Deadline: Mailed entries must be postmarked no later than Monday, June 22.

Personal deliveries may be delivered ONLY on Thursday, June 25 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE JUDGED!

- Judging will be on <u>Thursday and Friday</u>, June 25 and 26. All participants agree to allow photographs to be taken of displayed items. If requested, individual artist's telephone number may be released by CGS so that visitors may contact the artist after the show.
- Pick-up will be Sunday, June 28 from 3:00 5:00 p.m. Entries may not be removed early. Mailed entries will be returned within two weeks after the show. **Mailed entries must have return postage and self addressed shipping container.**
- All art work not picked up or arranged for pre-paid return will be donated to CGS.
- The California Gourd Society will officiate in all judging.
- While every effort is made to provide security for your items, the Welburn Gourd Farm and the California Gourd Society are not responsible for damaged or lost items.

CATEGORIES: IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE ARTIST TO ENTER THEIR PIECE IN THE CORRECT CATEGORY. Judges will not move pieces from one category to another. Be certain that you have read the specific criteria outline for the category and make your decision accordingly, e.g. if the criteria specify carving with natural or clear finish only, DO NOT stain the piece or add other embellishments.. If you have questions about proper category placement, check with those taking in the pieces. Volunteers will be available on Thursday, June 25th, to answer questions. They may provide advice, but you must make the final determination for placement of your piece. Pieces entered in incorrect categories cannot be judged.

20 CATEGORIES: NOVICE & OPEN

GOURDS MUST PREDOMINATE. INDICATE ON YOU ENTRY FORM WHICH DIVISION YOU ARE ENTERING AND SPECIFY THE CATEGORY BY NUMBER AND TITLE.

Category 1: Gourd with weaving or coiling of natural or manmade materials

Category 2: Challenge: "Introspection" - focus on the inside surface of the gourd, may be a diorama or any other interpretation. Any media or technique allowed.

Category 3: Painting. Whole or cut gourd. Painting must be featured. On entry form, please specify type of media used.

Category 4: Pyrography. Whole or cut gourd. Wood burned only. Natural or clear finish.

Category 5: Carving, gouging or engraving: Whole or cut gourd. Carving must not completely penetrate the gourd surface. e.g. no holes into the interior of the gourd.

Category 6: Fretwork: Design produced by cutting through the gourd shell and removing some portions entirely.

Category 7: Mixed Media: Whole or cut gourd. On entry form please indicate materials used. Any technique allowed.

Category 8: Inlay: Materials (Beads, stones, "Inlace", etc.) must be imbedded into the gourd surface to create design and/or accents.

Category 9: Jewelry: Whole or cut gourds and/or pieces. Any technique allowed. Additional materials and embellishments may be used but use of gourds must be obvious.

Category 10: Hats: Single or multiple gourds, whole or cut. Any style.

Category 11: Texture: Create texture on the surface of a whole gourd. On entry please note texture media used.

Category 12: Miniature gourd art works: May not be larger than 3" in any direction.

Category 13: Inspired by Native America: May be influenced by any native group in North, Central or South America. On entry state name of continent and/or civilization.

Category 14: Drum: Any style permitted but must be playable.

Category 15: Holidays and celebrations: May be created from one or more gourds. Any finish, "No manufactured flowers or accessories of plastic, please."

Category 16: Doll or human figure: Single or multiple gourds may be used to create a single figure. Any technique allowed. Gourds must predominate.

Category 17: California the Golden: Feature aspects of the great state of California. Any medium. Whole or cut gourd.

Category 18: Animals of pre-history: May be real or imaginary. Single or multiple gourds may be used.

Category 19: Birdhouse: Be creative, seek the unusual. May be decorative or actually intended for bird habitation. A hanger or stabilizing device for table display must be provided. **Category 20:** Lamps and illuminated gourds: Single or multiple gourds may be used. May be electric or otherwise illuminated.

MASTERS DIVISION 2009

Category 1: The Botanical World: Depict the world of plants. Mixed media permitted. Use one or multiple gourds.

Category 2: Gourd basket: Must have a handle made of natural material.

Category 3: Ink and/or colored pencil: Any ink or colored pencil may be used. May be sealed with a clear finish.

Category 4: Assemblage: Combine five or more whole gourds to create a unified work of art.

Category 5: Carving and pyrography: Combine these two techniques to decorate a single gourd. May be whole or cut. Clear finish allowed.

<u>Children and Youth are also eligible to enter any</u> "Novice" Category.

CHILDREN 12 AND UNDER—Entries should be created by the artist with minimal adult assistance.

Category 1: Birdhouse - May be decorative or for use by birds.

Category 2: Anything goes. Create something that is useful or decorative. May be single or multiple gourds. Any technique allowed. Use your imagination.

YOUTH 13-17—Should be work of entrant only.

Category 1: Anything goes. Create a piece, functional or decorative. May be single or multiple gourds. Any technique allowed. Use your imagination.

Category 2: My favorite color: Decorate a gourd with a design that features your favorite color. May be a whole or cut gourd.

Category 3: Footed vessel: Make a gourd container with legs. For example you may use gourds, stones, wood or other materials for legs.

JIM STORY AWARD 2009 DIVISION - Open to ALL levels of artist/growers.

Category 1: Hand-trained or manipulated gourds: Gourds that were influenced by you, the grower, while they were growing. For example they may be twisted, knotted, molded or otherwise guided during the growing process. Gourd must be cleaned and left natural or given a clear finish.

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INSPIRATION ABOUNDS

"Where did you ever get the idea for that?" is a question I often hear. The truth is, I'm convinced creative ideas are floating in the air and some just wiggle their way into your conscience if you let them. Some people, however, seem to need a nudge to get them moving.

It would be tempting to say I get all my ideas in my dreams. Actually, some impressions do come to me in the middle of the night and I find myself sitting on the edge of the bed making quick sketches or jotting down ideas such as "do a gourd with a nature theme, using unnatural colors."

I like to twist things around and try to see them from a different vantage point. That gourd I was going to use for a bowl might be more effective turned upside down or sideways. What would happen if I made a free-form cut in the top instead of the usual round hole? How could the shape be enhanced by adding pieces or removing sections?

Taking classes is an excellent way to learn new techniques and may serve as a springboard for creating alternative projects. Many gourd instructors have offered variations on the design or technique they are teaching. Chatting with my classmates as I work introduces new ideas, as well, often unrelated to the project at hand. Brainstorming with your friends may bring a deluge of creativity. A wealth of design ideas can be generated to set your imagination off in fresh directions. And don't overlook children. They have unfettered minds and offer some of the most clever and original thoughts.

There are all kinds of design books out there, many with copyright-free images you can use or adapt for your needs. They're wonderful as they are written, but sometimes an image is just what you need to get your mind moving in a new direction.

Sometimes I'm inspired by colors or patterns in linens – looking through catalogs or white sale ads can be very motivating. I also get design ideas from art jewelry. I'm always thinking how designs will translate to a gourd, as a border or a large statement. Of course, I don't copy those designs directly, but use the general ideas to start with and see where they take me.

When I take my daily walks, patterns in tree bark or the shadows thrown by trees get my creative juices flowing. The trick is to keep your eyes and mind open at all times – look around and try to see everyday things in a new way.

It's fun to focus creativity around a single word. For instance, what kinds of mind pictures are generated by the words "simplicity", "freedom", "energy", and "puzzle"? How about emotions: "fear", "rage", "serenity"? Close your eyes and let your mind's eye see these things. You'll be surprised and pleased (hopefully) at the innovative ideas that come to you. Sketch them out or jot them down so you can build on them when you actually have a gourd in your hand.

Of course, any gourd artist knows that often gourds have their own minds about things, and the design that starts out using one idea is diverted mid stream, so to speak, into another direction altogether. But, at least creativity is generated and may lead to a whole series of similar pieces.

Sometimes it's the utility of the item I plan to make that dictates its design. But as often as not, I'll try to stretch my imagination and make it beautiful and useful at the same time. Why, after all, does a spoon, for example, always have to have the same shape? Can't it be just as useful in the shape of a triangle? Or a spork?

I have several binders containing my sketches and design ideas that refresh my imagination when I'm a bit short on inventiveness. It also includes photos of other types of art that encourage me to try something similar.

I tend to work best under pressure of deadlines, but still may need a kick start to get me moving. That's when I most often turn to my inspiration binders. Next time you have an artist's block, why not give that a try?
