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President's Message

Greeting Fellow Gourders,

Organizing this year's gourd festivals is well underway. CGS has three gourd competitions this year. A new festival with CGS gourd art competition will be held in Orangevale which will take the place of the one we had at Davis Ranch. Calabash in San Martin will also host CGS gourd competition as will the Orange County Patch in Southern California as part of the Woodcarver's Show. So there's plenty of opportunity to enter your gourd art. Check out the dates and locations in this newsletter and get the dates on your calendar. There will be some great categories so get to work on those gourds so you can enter. And don't forget your local county fairs.

How are your gourd plants doing? They're all planted right? Mine are in the ground but haven't started putting out any vines yet. I don't have much room but I use every spot I can. I planted a couple plants that should be tall body gourds. Anyway that's what the seeds came out of. Then I planted some snake gourds on my trellis so they will grow tall and straight for rain sticks. Last but not least I planted a

couple long handle dippers. I so hope that they all grow like crazy and produce many gourds. I will try some manipulation on the long handle dippers for our Jim Story competition. As I mentioned in an article I wrote for the 2012 Spring issue of the Golden Gourd, I start out with a 10-10-10 fertilizer and once the vines are going well and begin to produce flowers I change to a 0-10-10 which promotes flowering. I have installed bubbler heads on my sprinklers where I have my gourd plants because they don't like to get their leaves wet from sprinklers.



Have you visited the CGS Facebook page? Post your pictures of gourd plants so we can all see who's growing gourds and how they're doing.

I attended the Northern Patch Leaders Meeting a few weeks ago. All of our Northern patch leaders got together and had a great time. The East Bay Gourd Artists hosted our meeting and we had a fun project making faux raku gourd shards. I brought my snowman totem to show and encourage patches to start making totems for the CGS opportunity drawing that will be held in Visalia this next April. Tickets were also distributed so your patch leader will have them at your meetings for purchase.

Tips & Tricks by Betty Finch

Washing a large volume of gourds

Here is one more gourd washing trick, this one is for teachers, growers, and crafters who need to clean a large volume of gourds. This requires an initial investment but pays off in saved time. Purchase a cement mixer with a plastic barrel. Fill the bottom of the mixer with a medium that is tougher than gourd skin but softer than gourd shell. Bits of rubber such as artificial redwood chips, plastic scraps, walnut shells are some examples. Experiment. (find something that works even better and share your discovery with the rest of us!) Add water and gourds. Tilt the barrel of the mixer up just enough that the gourds don't jump out, yet they roll over rather than simply spinning in a circle. A tub of water can be placed under the mouth of the mixer to catch any escaping gourds that jump out. The water will keep them damp keep them from picking up grit, and prevent cracking. Run the mixer until the only skin left on the gourds is in recessed areas. Then quickly scrub the recessed areas by hand and dunk each gourd to rinse it off and place the clean gourds on a drying rack. Moderately moldy gourds will clean up in about 15 minutes. Tougher skin takes longer and very moldy gourds take only a few minutes. Be careful not to run the mixer longer than necessary or to use gritty medium. This will result in rings around the widest parts of the gourd where the surface is worn completely off.

How to quickly make a Perfectly-Fitting Gourd Hat

With the rising popularity of gourd Hat Parades, here is a tip to easily make any large gourd into a perfectly-fitting (for you) hat.

Find some wire that is easy to bend, but firm enough to hold it's shape. Floral wire coated with spongy material will work. Wrap the wire around your head where the hatband would fit. Twist to secure and pat until it will hold the shape of your head. Carefully lift the wire off and place it on a sheet of paper. Trace a pattern of both the inside and the outside. Note which direction is the front on your pattern. Make two copies of your pattern on heavy paper or flexible spongy rubber sheets. Cut out one pattern on the inside line and the other one on the outside line. Both the paper with the hole and the center part cut from the paper can be used as a patterns, save them all for quick future hats. Where a tight fit is important use the smallest patterns, when you will add lining use the larger ones. IMPORTANT. Make sure before you cut that you have the front facing the direction you want it to go.

Use a rat-tail file or sandpaper to fine-tune the fit if needed. Finish the inside so your had doesn't dribble debris on your head. A fast easy method is to coat the cleaned interior with Mod Podge. You can dress it up by applying strips of tissue paper. You can wear your gourd hat as-is, but it is more fun to decorate it we all enjoy seeing the creative ideas people come up with to decorate their hats.

Hat Parades have been around a long time at the Indiana and Ohio gourd festivals. Some people there spend a lot of time making a signature hat they wear to all the festivals. Others make funny new hats every year to wear in the parade. Some make a serious hat to wear during the festivals and switch to a new hat just for the parade. Be ready it is coming to California! Since the American Gourd Society Jim Story Committee has endorsed Hat Parades they are becoming quite the rage. Beautiful, realistic, "serious" hats and funny, goofy, comical hats are both welcome in hat parades.

The Requirements For Great Gourd Growth and Production by Cecile Garrison

Come on California Gourd Growers-bring the Jim Story Award to California! Get an arbor up and plant some dippers! I will be describing the process as it happens in my arbor on Facebook!

We can do this!

- Your soil should be loose and drain well with a pH in the mid range. When I was about eight, I watched my farmer dad make a ball of dirt and squeeze it. Now I know he was checking the moisture content and porosity of the soil. I rototill composted steer manure (my only soil amendment) into my beds twice a year to replace lost nutrients Some people add commercial fertilizer but beware of excessive Nitrogen-you may have pretty, lush plants but few gourds. Mulch with straw or bark to retain moisture.
- At least six hours of sun is required for healthy plants. Large leaves will protect the gourds from too much sun in the hot afternoon.
- The plants must have room to grow. My biggest fault is overplanting which leads to crowding which sometimes leads to disease opportunities. Air circulation is critical!
- Prune primary and secondary vines. The secondary vines produce the fruit.
- Moisture in the root zone is also critical. I use drip hoses so the roots are watered
 but the leaves stay dry. You should water in the morning so any wet leaves have
 all day to dry. Warm, moist conditions can lead to Powdery Mildew and other
 issues.
- The soil temperature in the root area should be at least 65 degrees before planting.
- Be careful with cultivating the soil once the vines start to run. I use a hula hoe.
- Do not spray a herbicide near the plants-you will be sorry if you do!
- I do not use pesticides of any kind. It took two or three years without pesticides to turn this little farm into a fairly pest free environment. We have a bird, frog, lizard and beneficial insect haven. If I see a snail I throw them on the lawn for bird consumption. If I spot a cu cumber beetle I squish him even though they do pollinate blooms.
- Help the insects with pollination if you want to increase production. I
 use a fluffy artists brush to transfer the pollen from the male to the
 female. You have less than twenty-four hours during the bloom cycle
 to accomplish pollination. If the pepo turns brown and shrivels up in
 a week or so pollination did not work.
- Do not harvest until the vine is brown from the ground to the gourd. If you harvest before that you risk a rotting gourd.

Instructions

- 1. Drill holes in a spinner gourd one hole at the top and one hole in the bottom.
- 2. Tie a string in the top hole
- 3. Fill a cup with warm water
- 4. Drop 3 to 4 drops of a nail polish, in 3 or 4 different colors into water, Let the Polish spread across the top of the water
- 5. Dip your gourd in the polish, let the polish fold around the gourd
- 6. Let the polish dry, if you want more color re-dip after the polish is dry or paint with the nail brush. Let the gourd dry in the cup using a tooth pick or pencil to hold the gourd
- 7. Cut the long section of the spinner gourd
- 8. Push the wire into the gourd from the bottom of where the small hole is through the big hole of the gourd. Bend the wire to hold the gourd still.
- 9. On the small hole add a small bead cap and a bead on the wire. Using your round jewelry pliers wrap the wire around the pliers forming a circle around the pliers on the outer side of the bead. Wrap the wire around the straight wire 3 times between the circle and the bead. The big Bead cap goes over the big hole and the small bead cap goes over the small hole.
- 10. On the big hole side of the gourd add a big bead cap, a bead, and add a charm on the wire on the end where the big hole is. The big bead cap goes over the big hole and the small bead cap goes over the small hole
- 11. Using your round jewelry pliers wrap the wire around the pliers forming a circle between the bead and the charm, leaving the charm in the circle of wire. Wrap the wire around the straight wire 3 times between the circle and the bead.







☐ Mailed entries will be accepted. See DIRECTIONS FOR MAILED ENTRIES on page 13.
☐ Mailed entries must be received by September 27th.
□LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE JUDGED.
□Judging will take place on Saturday from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. The display will be open for viewing on Saturday
from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and all day Sunday.
☐ Release and pick up of entries will be from 3 p.m5 p.m. on Sunday, October 1, 2017. All art work not picked
up will become the property of CGS.
□CGS reserves the right to photograph each entry and use in promotion of CGS Art Competition.
□ While every effort is made to provide security of items, the Folsom and Amador Gourd Artist Groups, the Cali-
fornia Gourd Society and Orangevale Community Center are not responsible for damaged or lost items.
☐ The artist is responsible for placing his or her piece in the correct category .
Note: Please read category and division descriptions carefully. Design your art work for the categories.

General Rules

- 1. Gourds must predominate. 50% of medium or technique to be used on the crafted gourd surface should exhibit the required medium or technique.
- 2. Gourds previously entered in a CGS competition and judged by AGS guidelines will not be permitted.
- 3. Craft/artwork for each entry must be the **original** work of person who is the entrant.
- 4. Only one entry per category is permitted.

The competition is open to AII

- 5. No class gourds are permitted, except for the Novice division.
- 6. Judges reserve the right to disqualify or reassign entries that do not meet category criteria.
- 7. Copyright designs such as Disney characters or copies of other artist's work may not be used on entries unless written permission is granted by the artist or copyright holder. Copyright free designs may be used.
- 8. All participants agree to allow photographs to be taken of displayed items.
- 9. Not all categories may be included in each division.
- 10. Category definitions may be the same for Novice; Intermediate; Advanced and Master Craftsman, but will be judged according to **Division** level.

Judging

The California Gourd Society will coordinate all judging. Judging will follow the American Gourd Society judging guidelines and will use AGS trained judges. Scoring option "A" (Detailed Scoring) will be used. 1-5 points will be given for Originality of design, Quality of craftsmanship and gourd, Creativity and artistry, Color and/or finish, accessories, decorative work, and Appropriateness for category.

Pins will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each category at the judge's discretion. A category with only one entry does not necessarily guarantee a 1st place pin.

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California Gourd Society Northern California Gourd Competition 2017 Divisions & Categories

Youth Divisions (there is no fee for entry in Youth Division)

Junior - Under 12

Teens - Ages 13-17

Category - One decorated gourd using any technique

Novice Division - The Novice Division is for those who are relatively new to the art form and have been working with gourds for three years or less. The Novice should not have sold gourds or taught a gourd class for a fee.

- N1 Pyrography Burning a design (line or shading) on a gourd with the use of any wood-burning tool.
- **N2** Carving/Fretwork/Filigree The removal of a portion of the outer surface of the gourd, exposing the undersurface to create a design or texture in relief and/or a decorative design (of holes and other shapes) cut through the shell of the gourd.
- N3 Painted/Coloring Techniques Any coloring technique, using stains, dyes, inks, oil pastel pencils, crayons, colored pencils, felt tip pens, acrylic paints, oil paints, watercolors, etc.
- **N4 Embellishments** The use of embellishments must predominate. Any material that is added to the gourd to enhance the overall design and appearance of the gourd.
- **N5 Mixed Media** Use of two or more techniques or mediums to decorate the gourd.
- **N6** Gourds Crafted in a Class or Tutorial This piece may be from a class or a pattern. The teacher and the class or book used must be identified.

Intermediate Division - The Intermediate Division is for those artists who understand and use basic techniques. Entrants should not have won a major award in a gourd show or a juried art show. They may have sold gourds, but have not taught a gourd class for a fee.

- **I7 Pyrography** Burning a design (line or shading) on a gourd with the use of an electric wood-burning tool.
- **I8** Carving/Fretwork/Filigree The removal of a portion of the outer surface of the gourd, exposing the undersurface to create a design or texture in relief and/or a decorative design (of holes and other shapes) cut through the shell of the gourd.
- **19 Painted/Coloring Techniques** Any coloring technique, using stains, dyes, inks, oil pastel pencils, crayons, colored pencils, felt tip pens, acrylic paints, oil paints, watercolors, etc.
- **I10 Jewelry** May use multiple gourds and accessories (beads, leather, string, thread, cord, clasps etc). Any technique allowed.
- **I11 Fiber Art** The gourd may be woven, twined, or coiled with natural or manmade materials. Traditional or Freestyle Tenerife is included in this category.
- **I12 Beading** The technique of using beads to apply a design to a gourd. Beads may be applied with beeswax, embedded in recessed holes, strung and wrapped around, or sewn to the gourd. Beads can be plastic, glass or natural material, i.e. shell, wood, clay or seeds, etc. Beading must be the focal point but other techniques and mediums may be used.
- **I13** Anything Goes Let your imagination take you away.

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Advanced Division - The Advanced Division is for artists who have progressed to a more complicated level of work and have a good grasp of multiple techniques or finishing skills. They may have taught a gourd class for a fee but are not showing in galleries.

- **A14 Pyrography** Burning a design (line or shading) on a gourd with the use of an electric wood-burning tool.
- **A15** Carving/Fretwork/Filigree The removal of a portion of the outer surface of the gourd, exposing the undersurface to create a design or texture in relief and/or a decorative design (of holes and other shapes) cut through the shell of the gourd.
- **A16** Painted/Coloring Techniques Any coloring technique, using stains, dyes, inks, oil pastel pencils, crayons, colored pencils, felt tip pens, acrylic paints, oil paints, watercolors, etc.
- **A17 Jewelry** May use multiple gourds and accessories (beads, leather, string, thread, cord, clasps etc). Any technique allowed.
- **A18** Fiber Art The gourd may be woven, twined, or coiled with natural or manmade materials. Traditional or Freestyle Tenerife is included in this category.
- **A19 Beading** The technique of using beads to apply a design to a gourd. Beads may be applied with beeswax, embedded in recessed holes, strung and wrapped around, or sewn to the gourd. Beads can be plastic, glass or natural material, i.e. shell, wood, clay or seeds, etc. Beading must be the focal point but other techniques and mediums may be used.
- **A20** Anything Goes Let your imagination take you away.

Master Division - The Master Division is for artist whose work shows excellent use of all techniques and finishing skills. The work is of original design and not from a class (unless they have taught the class). Their work may have shown in galleries, won top awards in art/gourd competitions and have reached the level of fine art.

- M21 Pyrography Burning a design (line or shading) on a gourd with the use of an electric wood-burning tool.
- **M22** Carving/Fretwork/Filigree The removal of a portion of the outer surface of the gourd, exposing the undersurface to create a design or texture in relief and/or a decorative design (of holes and other shapes) cut through the shell of the gourd.
- M23 Coiling/Weaving Gourd with weaving or coiling of any material, natural or man-made.
- **M24 Mixed Media** Gourd that incorporates three or more techniques and materials. Describe materials and techniques used on entry form.
- M25 Anything Goes Let your imagination take you away.
- **JS 26 Special Category In Honor of Jim Story** The entry must be a single dried manipulated gourd. Gourds may be grown in a mold or otherwise manipulated. Pieces should be left natural or finished with a clear finish only.

Please package your gourd with enough packing protection to insure safe return. Place the box to be returned to you inside the box addressed to the address below depending on which competition you are entering. Only one entry per box.

You must complete an entry form with all areas of the entry form filled in, along with a check for the dollar amount to cover each entry. If you have more than one entry you may submit a check for all entries in Box 1 (please label it Box 1). Entry forms should go in the box with their entry.

Gourd Crafting Terms and Definitions for All CGS Competitions

Accessories or Embellishments Any material added to the crafted gourd to complete the exhibit.

Artificial or Man-made Accessories/Embellishments Any material added to the crafted gourd that is not natural, such as artificial flowers, plastics, plastic eyes, or manufactured items.(See also Natural Accessories).

Artificial Sinew A waxed nylon imitation of natural sinew (animal tendon) used in beading, sometimes used in place of cotton thread. (Artificial sinew will be allowed on all entries).

Base A support or stand that holds a gourd at the proper angle or position. It may be metal, wood or a manufactured turn-table but the base will not be considered an accessory of the crafted gourd.

Basket A gourd with the top cut off with a carrying handle attached or cut so that part of the gourd remains to function as a handle.

Beading The technique of using beads to apply a design to gourd. Beads may be applied with beeswax, embedded in recessed holes, strung and wrapped around, or sewn to the gourd. Beads are made of plastic, glass, and/or natural material, i.e. shell, wood, clay or seeds.

Bowl A gourd with the top cut off (or some portion cut off) to give the appearance of a container.

Burned Using a Flame (i.e., small torch) to char or change the color of the gourd surface (See also Pyrography/Wood-burning.).

Carved The removal of a portion of the outer surface of the shell of a gourd, exposing the undersurface to create a design or texture in relief, usually done with a power tool.

Chip Carving Carving done with gouging tools to "chip" out small pieces of gourd to create a pattern or design on the surface of the gourd.

Clear Finish Any furnish, such as varnish, shellac, wax or oil, which enhances the overall appearance of the gourd but adds no color (except the slight natural darkening that may occur).

Coiled Use of pine needles or grasses (or other natural materials), wrapped and held in place by thread, raffia or sinew to cover rims of bowls or create designs on gourds.

Color/Coloring Using any medium that adds to, enhances, or changes the natural appearance of the gourd's surface. Some examples of color media are stains, dyes, inks, oil pastel pencils, crayons, colored pencils, felt tip pens, acrylic paints, oil paints, watercolors, colored waxes, etc.

Cut Gourd Cutting all the way through the gourd shell to create a hole or opening (as opposed to surface cuts as in carving). The cut or openings are incorporated into the design.

Embellishment/Accessories Any material that is added to the gourd to enhance the overall design and appearance of the gourd. (See also Artificial Accessories and Natural Accessories).

Fretwork An intricate, interlaced, decorative design (of holes or other shapes) cut into and through the shell of the gourd, usually done with power tools.

Functional An item fashioned to be used. For example, a gourd pitcher that actually holds water and has a functional spout and handle.

Medium/Media Material used for artistic expression, such as paint, dye, ink, etc.

Natural Accessories Any material added to the crafted gourd that is natural. Examples include linen/cotton thread, grasses, pine needles, seeds pods, shells, stones, bone, feathers, etc.

Pyrography/Wood-burning Burning a design (lines and shading) on a gourd with the use of an electric wood-burning tool.

Predominate The word "predominate" (when used in Competition Class description to indicate the amount of medium or technique to be used on the crafted gourd) means that the majority of the crafted gourd surface should exhibit the required medium or technique.

Weaving Interlacing various materials attached to the gourd, such as grasses, cords, natural fibers, etc.

Note: We have four divisions. Please read category and division descriptions carefully. Fit your art work to the categories.

General Rules

- I. Gourds must predominate. Entries must have a predominate focus of the medium or technique for the entry category. For example, if entered in Painting, the painting must be the focal point of the piece.
- 2. Gourds previously entered in a **CGS competition** and judged by AGS guidelines will not be permitted.
- 1. Craft/artwork for each entry must be the **original** work of person who is the entrant.
- 2. Only one entry per category is permitted.
- 3. No class gourds are permitted.
- 4. The Head Judge reserves the right to disqualify or reassign entries that do not meet category criteria. S/He may also change, subdivide, or combine categories as necessary.
- 5. Copyright designs such as Disney characters or copies of other artist's work may not be used on entries unless written permission is granted by the artist or copyright holder. Copyright free designs may be used.
- 6. All participants agree to allow photographs to be taken of displayed items.
- 7. Not all categories may be included in each division.
- 8. Category definitions may be the same for Novice; Intermediate; Advanced and Master Craftsman, but will be judged according to **Division** level.

Judging

The California Gourd Society will coordinate all judging. Judging will follow the American Gourd Society judging guidelines. Scoring option "A" (Detailed Scoring) will be used. I-5 points will be given for Originality of design, Quality of craftsmanship and gourd, Creativity and artistry, Color and/or finish, accessories, decorative work, and Appropriateness for category.

Awards

Awards will be given for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each category at the judge's discretion. A category with only one entry does not necessarily guarantee a 1st place. Winners can choose to receive a ribbon or pin for 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place awards.

Best of Show – Best of Division – Judges Choice – People's Choice (Votes will be collected from the viewing public both Saturday & Sunday)

Division Levels

NOVICE DIVISION

This division is for gourd crafters/artists who are relatively new to gourd crafting and have not won a 1st place as a Novice. The Novice should not have taught a gourd class for a fee. The entrant may have no extensive experience or expertise in any art form that has been used on an entry, such as painting, carving, wood-burning. If you have won a major award in a juried art show or won Best of Novice Division you must move up to the next division. Participation in the Novice division is limited to two years.

- 1. Category N-I Pyrography Wood-burning must predominate, but stain, dye or a small amount of color may be added to enhance the design.
- 2. Category N-2 Carved Relief-carved, to create texture, chipped, chiseled or power-carved, penetration or cutting entirely through the shell is allowed. May embellish with color. A whole or opened gourd may be used.
- 3. Category N-3 Filigree or Fretwork The design cuts entirely through the gourd shell and may be embellished with color.
- 4. Category N-4 Painted or colored Whole or cut gourd. Variety of coloring mediums allowed: paint, stains, dyes, inks, oil pastels, pencils, crayons, etc.
- 5. Category N-5 Fiber/Weaving/Coiled a gourd woven or coiled with mixed, natural, or man-made materials. Any weaving technique.
- 6. Category N-6 Mixed Media any combination of three or more techniques or mediums.

INTERMEDIATE DIVISION

The Intermediate Division is for artists who understand and use basic techniques. Entrants should not have won a major award in a gourd show or a juried art show. They may have sold gourds but have not taught a gourd class for a fee.

- 1. Category I-I Pyrography Wood-burning must predominate, but stain, dye or a small amount of color may be added to enhance the design.
- 2. Category I-2 Carved Relief-carved, to create texture, chipped, chiseled or power-carved, penetration or cutting entirely through the shell is allowed. May embellish with color. A whole or opened gourd may be used.
- 3. Category I-3 Filigree or Fretwork The design cuts entirely through the gourd shell and may be embellished with color. (Continued on Page 19)

INTERMEDIATE DIVISION (continued)

- 4. **Category I-4 Painted or colored** Whole or cut gourd. Variety of coloring mediums allowed: paint, stains, dyes, inks, oil pastels, pencils, crayons, etc.
- 5. **Category I-5 Fiber/Weaving/Coiled** a gourd woven or coiled with mixed, natural, or man-made materials. Any weaving technique.
- 6. Category I-6 Mixed Media any combination of three or more techniques or mediums.

ADVANCED DIVISION

The Advanced Division is for artists who have progressed to a more complicated level of work and have a good grasp of multiple techniques and finishing skills. They are creating more distinctive, original work and are ready to compete with a wider range of competitors. They may have taught a gourd class for a fee but have not won top awards in art/gourd competitions. Once you have won Best of the Division or Best of Show in this competition, you must move up to the next division.

- 1. Category A-I Pyrography Wood-burning must predominate, but stain, dye or a small amount of color may be added to enhance the design.
- 2. **Category A-2 Carved** Relief-carved, to create texture, chipped, chiseled or power-carved, penetration or cutting entirely through the shell is allowed. May embellish with color. A whole or opened gourd may be used.
- 3. **Category A-3 Filigree or Fretwork** The **design** cuts entirely through the gourd shell and may be embellished with color.
- 4. **Category A-4 Painted or colored** Whole or cut gourd. Variety of coloring mediums allowed: paint, stains, dyes, inks, oil pastels, pencils, crayons, etc.
- 5. **Category A-5 Fiber/Weaving/Coiled** a gourd woven or coiled with mixed, natural, or man-made materials. Any weaving technique.
- 6. Category A-6 Mixed Media any combination of three or more techniques or mediums.

MASTER CRAFTSMAN DIVISION

The Master Division artist's work shows excellent use of all techniques and finishing skills. The work is of original design. Their work may have been shown in galleries, previously won top awards in art/gourd competitions, and have reached the level of fine art. **NOTE**: Artists entering this Division are **NOT** allowed to enter Novice or Intermediate Divisions. Artists in this Division who are learning or perfecting a new skill and wish to enter a gourd utilizing that technique may enter that item in the Advanced Division. Master Artists may include a biography with their entry form, which will be displayed with the entry. (Please furnish frame for display).

- 1. **Category M-I Pyrography** Wood-burning must predominate, but stain, dye or a small amount of color may be added to enhance the design.
- 2. **Category M-2 Carved** Relief-carved, to create texture, chipped, chiseled or power-carved, penetration or cutting entirely through the shell is allowed. May embellish with color. A whole or opened gourd may be used.
- 3. Category M-3 Filigree or Fretwork The design cuts entirely through the gourd shell and may be embellished with color.
- 4. **Category M-4 Painted or colored** Whole or cut gourd. Variety of coloring mediums allowed: paint, stains, dyes, inks, oil pastels, pencils, crayons, etc.
- 5. **Category M-5 Fiber/Weaving/Coiled** a gourd woven or coiled with mixed, natural, or man-made materials. Any weaving technique.
- 6. Category M-6 Mixed Media any combination of three or more techniques or mediums.
