President's Message

Greetings Gourders,

Spring has offered a number of opportunities for our members to assuage their gourd passion.

The Leiser Farm Gourd Festival in May was a great draw for those living in the northern part of our state. Extreme heat and high fuel costs kept some away but many hardy souls were there with us buying and selling gourds and gourd supplies. Greg and Mary Leiser were as gracious as ever and offered bins and bins of wonderful gourds in a wide array of shapes and sizes.

As spring turned to summer you could find many CGS members hard at work at the Welburn Gourd Festival. Wow, the patches really stepped up and sent us more gourd art entries for the competition! We saw an increase of about 50 entries over last year with a total of 243 pieces on display. The best part, however, was not the number of entries but the number of competitors. There were 116 individual CGS members who brought or sent their work to the competition. Now that is great participation! Thank you to all who took up the challenge. I hope you enjoyed the experience as much as all of the visitors enjoyed seeing the great variety of talent among you.

I have received a number of comments and questions about the competition and the judging. Despite our best efforts to keep competitors informed of the expectations for each category and points on which each piece will be judged there are always disappointments. Our nine judging teams did their best to fairly evaluate each piece in each category and then total points to determine how pieces would be ranked. The score cards competitors received for each piece may reflect some inconsistencies in the way the categories were judged, but within a category the scoring was relative as it was done by the same judging team. If you have any constructive suggestions for improving the process I would welcome your input and hope you would work with us to make improvements where needed.

Our thanks is given to all the volunteers who helped make this event a success not the least of which are Peggy Blessing, our volunteer recruiter/coordinator, Charlene Smith, the Craft Arena coordinator, the competition judges and clerks, as well as the volunteers who donated many, many hours. Overall we had fewer volunteers so we thank those who stepped up and did longer shifts and hung in to help where ever needed. By Peggy's estimate we had 60 volunteers, and put the total number of hours at somewhere around 400! We also had a lot of renewals and added 21 new or lapsed members to the ranks. Almost 50 children and over 45 adults created gourd art in the crafting arena pretty good considering that heat!. My personal thanks goes to Mary Bliss who arrived early to help set up and was helpful in every phase of making the event a success.

Have a great summer! Keep watch over those growing gourds and take time to create some beautiful new works of art.

Barbara McDermott and I went up on Friday – the day before the festival – and had dinner at Fat City in Old Sacramento. I had never been to Old Sac before and you wouldn't even know it was there from the freeway. It's below the city street levels and has some original buildings and streets. It was fun to shop through the stores there, too. We stayed in Woodland during the festival at the Quality Inn. The drive was only one freeway exit to the road to the farm.

As always, Greg and Mary Leiser were perfect hosts for the festival. What friendly, warm and helpful people they are! Barbara had a booth and sold quite a few of her lovely painted pieces and rainsticks. The weather was HOT, but didn't seem to keep the visitors from coming out and sure didn't dampen our spirits. We had a ball visiting with other vendors, as well.

Classes were held on Saturday, and I took the gourd bowl with pine needle rim and lid topped with a pinecone, taught by Linda Pietz. She's a wonderful instructor and the class was so much fun. I learned a lot and made what I think is an adorable bowl. I'm sure I'll use the technique again. From what I could hear in other classes, everyone had a good time and was pleased with their finished gourds. After the class, I had lunch at the vendor setup – long lines because there was only one food stand, but the food was really great. As a matter of fact, I had lunch there both days, even though we had brought some stuff to eat in our ice chest. Had a delish chicken burrito the first day and a wonderful chili dog the next.

It was fun visiting all the vending booths – so much gorgeous gourd art and an amazing assortment of supplies. One of my co-workers had given me a gift certificate for Leiser's for my retirement, so, of course, I got some gourds and a beautiful little dipper gourd with knotted handle. I must have visited every booth several times, and always saw something I had missed the first time.

Since I wasn't selling anything during the festival, I had brought along some projects to work on, and completed all but one of them! I made a knotless netted bowl, then bought some wonderful jasper to do the rim treatment from Kathy Riker – who had a huge booth this year – 5 spaces worth of wonderful stuff. Also bought some more supplies from Betsy Roberts and a switch stand for my PowerCrafter from Nancy Brown. I got a beautiful little gourd ornament from Judy Burge – exquisite!










C.G. S. at Work For You and By You

Inspiration from the Tulare Sequoia Gourd Patch


The Tulare Sequoia Gourd Patch was asked "What books inspire you in your gourd art?"


Linda: National Geographic for the textiles, colors, cultures, especially the faces of old people and children. They have such stories to tell that encompasses the whole world. They're free at Linda's Used Bookstore in Visalia when you come for the conference in 2010.

Toni: Native American books, and <u>Navajo Book of Basket Making</u>. I love the patterns, but even more try to incorporate the philosophies into my work.

Kathryn: Native American images and rock art. I also browse the Internet for pictures.


- Pat and Don: <u>Techniques of Basketry</u> by Virginia Harvey it has lots of samples and illustrations. We also use <u>Contemporary</u> <u>Wicker Basketry</u> with its samples, demonstrations and clear directions.
- Peggy and Dwayne: Bonnie Gibson's book for tips and ideas. When we started we used the bible Ginger Summit's <u>Gourd</u> <u>Art</u>. We also use <u>Gourd Pyrography</u> by Jim Widess.
- Dianne: Bonnie Gibson's book, and Jim Widess's <u>Gourd Carving</u> book. I use two magazines Southwest Art, and Art of the West. And anything with horses, of course!
- Sam: At first I used various books, but now I like pictures of birds and critters in magazines, and get a lot of inspiration when we get together with various projects. I like to see work done by other people.
- Sue: I tear pictures out of catalogs and magazines like the Metropolitan Museum of Art and Archaeology Magazine.
- Gretchen: American Indian Basketry by Otis Mason, The Goddesses and Gods of Old Europe by Marija Gimbutas, Field Guide to Birds of North America by the National Geographic Society, and Field Guide to Reptiles and Amphibians by the Audubon Society. I like to see real details before personalizing it on my gourds.
- Carol: (Oh dear her phone has been busy all evening I'll get her books for next time!)
- Lynn: I make inspiration boards I cut out pictures from various magazines for the art, colors, shapes. I put them on tag board in categories (masks, waterfalls, dolls, etc.) and have the stacked in the corner. Then I put one on my work table for inspiration.
- Noi: Bonnie Gibson's book, and work by Toni or Carrie Dearing. I try to bring in my Thai culture. I also use nature books for flowers and birds. I like to look at the real picture first. The woodburning has to become so real that it can almost look back at you. Then I know I'm done.
- Ann: I use nature books, and also just looking around outside. I can see so many different kinds of leaves outside my window.

Gourds are one of the oldest cultivated crops that are believed to have spanned the entire globe in prehistoric times. They were known mostly by cultures in temperate and tropical zones because this is where gourds grow best.



Gourds were most commonly used for storing supplies, hauling water, making cooking and eating utensils, musical instruments, and bird feeders, bird houses, and rattles.

Today gourds are still considered one of natures greatest gifts to mankind.

There are many surprising aspects to gourds. From their oddly shaped seeds they produce prolific growth. The plants will spread and climb on everything in their area: fences, trees, buildings, etc. They are a joy to watch growing, and require little care other than regular watering. They must be harvested before a killing frost, as even a mild frost will usually damage them, causing them to rot rather than to cure and dry normally.



Gourds are also surprising in their many and varied shapes and colors. When dried and cleaned, each one will have its own natural blemishes and scars, which serve to enhance their natural beauty. They are also surprisingly light and fragile. Dropping one from even a short distance will usually crack it. Gourds are truly "nature's pottery"

The First Golden Gourdy pictured below is by Toni Best and is awarded to Darlene Propp for her contributions in the Spring 2008 issue.


