Tips & Tricks by Betty Finch

Since the American Gourd Society Jim Story Committee has endorsed Hat Parades they are becoming quite the rage. The California Gourd Society will have a hat parade during the September 29 - Oct 1 Northern Gourd Art Competition & Exhibit in Orangevale, CA. There will also be a hat parade at the CGS Retreat in Oakhurst August 9 - 12. CGS members attending are encouraged to make and wear a gourd hat. Photographs of the top gourd hats will be published in "The Gourd Magazine", a national publication of the American Gourd Society. This weeks Tips & Tricks is therefore devoted to gourd hats.

Here is a tip about attending events with hat parades. Make two hats. Wear one around the festival and save your best or funniest one as a surprise for the hat parade. A little history - hat parades came into existence at the Indiana Gourd Festivals, a product of Jim Story who privately encouraged the craftiest people to make and wear a gourd hat and jewelry to the festival. Then at the well-attended Sunday Breakfast Jim would ask all the people wearing hats to come up to the front of the room for a round of applause. Jim would stand behind the top

hats with his arm raised and ask by applause to choose a favorite. Sometimes the participants would be asked to walk around the room so people in the back could see their hat up close. The ritual evolved over the years as more and more participants joined in. So many people started participating that Jim began breaking it down into separate kids, men and women parades and asking each group to circle the room twice before the individual applause.

Eventually prizes were added. Jim continued contacting talented individuals well before the festivals saying things like "I can't wait to see what kind of hat you make for the hat parade this year!" The eventual result was more participants than spectators!. The fun was contagious and hat parades sprang up in other state gourd festivals. Now the tradition has made it to the West!

I can still remember how welcomed and included I felt the year Jim whispered to me, "The old timers keep their new hat hidden until the last minute". Clued in, I removed my parade hat and hid it in a paper bag until the breakfast parade. So I'm sharing that bit of advice from Jim Story with you. Make two hats and save your special one as a surprise for the hat parade.

Many regular gourd festival attendees make a signature hat they wear every year during all the gourd festivals. It helps people recognize you. They make great conversation pieces. The practice adds a charming atmosphere and conveys a message to the general public that gourd crafters are light-hearted, fun-loving people. The hats also provide great photo opportunities for everyone. I've actually had people purchase the hat I was wearing right off my head.

The hat you plan on wearing all day should be comfortable and not interfere with the tasks you need to perform. This is not difficult because gourd hats are naturally lightweight and provide excellent insulation qualities. They can make shade to keep you cool in the Summer and they can keep your head warm in the winter. To keep your hair clean and to keep them from dribbling debris you will want to finish the interior of your all-day hat. This can be as simple as a coat of sprayed-on paint or as complicated as a sewn liner. I like to line mine with strips of paper decoupaged on and attach a soft foam piece where my head touches. A ribbon tie can be used to hold your hat on securely or you can construct your hat in such a way that it fits your head so perfectly it won't fall off when you bend over.

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To cut a hole in a gourd for a Perfectly-Fitting Gourd Hat. Wrap a wire around your head where the hatband would fit. Twist to secure .Trace a pattern of it on a piece of paper. Cut out the shape. Both the center piece and the hole can be used as a patterns to trace your head shape on to a gourd before you cut. Use a rat-tail file or sandpaper to fine-tune the fit if needed. I encourage each of you to participate in the California Gourd Society's

upcoming hat parades. Beautiful, realistic, "serious" hats, funny, goofy, comical hats, hats with moving parts,

multiple gourd hats, huge hats tiny hats, colorful hats and gourd colored hats, all are welcome in hat parades. Put on your thinking caps, get innovative. Originality is encouraged, nothing is too far out there. Start thinking and planning now... "I can't wait to see what will you make" whisper, whisper.








California State Fair - Recap by Barbara Rippetoe

Fall in The Gourd Garden and Gourd Festivals! by Cecile Garrison

By this time we all know what we did wrong in the Gourd garden and there is no turning back to make the 2017 crop better!

I have always discouraged overhead watering of gourd vines but this year I did it myself without thinking. I was very busy with family matters and thought I would take advantage of my son's overhead lawn sprinkler to water my adjacent arbor. I came to my senses when I noticed blooms were not opening. It seems when the sprinkler hit the pending blooms they changed their mind and rotted instead. I stopped but not before losing many potential dippers.

Next year I may have to apply a fertilizer with phosphorus and potassium to encourage more flower and fruit production. My only fertilizer has been steer manure for years and I think my soil yearns for more. It is too late to help this year's crop!

Next February I will start dipper gourd seeds inside. When volunteers show up in April I plan to yank them all out! I am sick of these imposters mingling with the ones I planted. They rob the chosen ones of light, water and air. I also have a history of planting too many and too close. At least six hours of sun is required for healthy plants and fruit and my haphazard planting has prevented air and light from reaching the plants.

It has not been all bad! I am closing in on last year's record twenty-five knotted gourds even though the overhead sprinkling destroyed a lot of the early crop preventing many more knot opportunities. I also have at least ten successful gourds growing nicely in various molds. We shall see how many make it through the maturing, drying and green cleaning process.

I hope to see many Art and Jim Story entries in festivals this fall. I plan to attend at least three festivals! If you are passing through Visalia, California stop by! We will talk gourds, techniques, tools, paints, embellishments and more!





Board Meeting Highlights - January 7, 2017

Board Members Present: Olive Moore, President; Pamela Argo, Vice President; Peggy Blessing, Secretary; JoAnn Clark, Vice President/Membership; Betty Finch, Director at Large; Rosalie Gochnour, Treasurer; Sue Gouig, Director of Northern Programs; Elaine Linton, Director of Southern Programs; and Susan Sullivan, Director at Large

Others Present: Mary Bliss, Editor/Golden Gourd; Christina Chrivia [left at 11:30pm]; Sherry Hunga-Moore, Creative Projects Chair; Debra Zimmerman.

President Olive Moore called the meeting to order at 9:05am at the home of JoAnn Clark in Valley Center, CA, and introductions were made. Olive reviewed the information packet she distributed.

Secretary Report

A motion was carried to approve the board meeting Minutes of the January 9 and 10, 2016, meetings as distributed. Motions that were approved electronically throughout 2016 were ratified by the Board: 1) On 2/17/16, hold a competition in conjunction with the Orange County Woodcarvers at the Elks Lodge in Santa Ana, CA, on 10/15-16/16; 2) On 2/17/16, to not charge a fee to advertise in Golden Gourd for CGS competition-only events; 3) On 2/16/16, to file an insurance claim to settle a copyright infringement dispute. Peggy clarified that CGS was responsible for any image published on our website whether or not we were aware it required permission as a copyrighted image. To avoid future liability in this area, there was consensus that we not publish flyers and brochures for others, but we will provide a link to the group's website instead. Peggy was asked to write up a statement to include in the policy document being developed.

It was clarified that the Golden Gourd (GG) no-cost advertisement policy applied to regional group events held on behalf of CGS that did not have revenue opportunities to offset costs. Pam offered to write up guidelines regarding this to include with the CGS policy documents being discussed later today.

Discussion followed regarding revisions to the membership brochure and application form due to regional group changes. Peggy will take responsibility for updating these documents.

Treasurer Report

Olive thanked Rosalie Gochnour for her work and for spending time with her last August to answer questions. She said we all put the Treasurer in a difficult position when we do not supply her with receipts in a timely manner or do not provide her enough details so that expenses can be categorized properly. After Rosalie answered her many questions this past week, Olive took the liberty to provide a marked-up copy of the 2016 financial statements to help Board members better understand what expenses made up various line items. A lengthy discussion followed regarding the 2016 financial statements. Total income was \$10,269, \$332 unfavorable to budget. Total expense was \$12,252.40, resulting in a net loss for 2016 of \$1,983.55 (\$976.45 better than the budgeted loss). The Balance Sheet was reviewed and various questions were answered. Assets totaled \$26,175.32 at the end of 2016.

Following discussion regarding Square account issues, it was suggested a formal Board authorization be made. A motion was carried to transfer the California Gourd Society Square account from Christina Chrivia to Rosalie Gochnour. Everyone was reminded to use Amazon Smile for their online purchases, naming CGS as a donation beneficiary.

Vice President's Report

Pam Argo said the new Rio Linda Gourd Artists group was now up and running. Discussion took place regarding the Northern CGS competition. It was reported that the Folsom Gourd Artists group did not want to bear responsibility for the 2017 CGS competition if it were held at the Calabash festival for a variety of reasons. The Folsom group was investigating an indoor facility to conduct an art festival (vs. craft fair) and would be willing to host and fully support the 2017 CGS competition. It was noted that Davis Ranch will no longer be holding a Fall festival. It was noted that we have allocated \$500 each for a northern and a southern competition.

A 2018 CGS cruise retreat option was discussed, and Pam gave cost estimates (3-night event, under \$400 per person, including all meals, parking, a dedicated craft room and 3 free cabins). She offered to donate her portion of the commission to CGS, which could be added to the fund for future retreats.

The meeting recessed for lunch at 11:30am. [Christina Chrivia left.] The meeting reconvened at 12:30pm.

Discussion resumed regarding the best time of year to hold the retreat, as well as ideas about activities that could take place. A motion was carried to proceed with plans to have a CGS cruise retreat in August 2018. It was recommended that a maximum of 80 CGS members have access to the retreat craft room.

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Membership Report

JoAnn Clark reported a current membership total of 438 (407 single and 31 family members). Of the total, 176 were either new or renewing in 2017, and some of these extend through 2018. JoAnn will contact patches to find out which are eligible for the free membership for being compliant with 100% of their group being CGS members during 2016. She reported that last year 6 patches received a free membership for being compliant during 2015. The bulk membership welcome letter with member card will be emailed in February. After that time, JoAnn will generate the letter and send it via US mail. Our Members Only webpage password will be valid through January 31, and a new one will be sent via email to current members. It was suggested that we consider at some future time the possibility of raising the family membership to \$25.

Directors of Northern and Southern Programs Combined Report

Sue Gouig reviewed a written report of the April 22 combined Patch Leaders meeting in Visalia prepared by Sherry Hunga-Moore. There were 13 patches out of 15 represented, and it was great to have Carol Rookstool in attendance. She thanked Elaine Linton for conducting a great Earth Day project. The patch leader group decided that the next fundraising project will be totems. Sherry had showed them a wonderful example of the stacked gourd concept, which they were excited about. There will be separate leader meetings in 2017. Elaine reported visiting the Ventura and GALA patch meetings and plans to attend an Orange County meeting soon. The 2018 patch leader meeting will take place jointly in Visalia prior to the basket and gourd conference.

It was noted that funds of \$680 remained in the northern region's scholarship fund. Pam was familiar with the school that recently inquired via the website, which may result in use of some of the available scholarship funds. If and when funds are spent, a report on how these monies were used will be published in the Golden Gourd.

Directors at Large/Ambassadors Report

Susan Sullivan noted there are many gourd artists in California that are not members of CGS and suggested we find ways to interest them to join. She said the Orange County group has learned the benefits of having an alliance like they have with the Orange County Woodcarvers. Ideas of other groups to partner with were discussed, such as Dremel groups, decorative painters, weavers, and Rockler Woodworking and Hardware stores. Susan gave left-over ribbons to each of the patches so they could make presentations at their local state fair or other competition events along these lines, with the goal to document the winner with photo and short article in the Golden Gourd to generate some interest and memberships. She said we should continue to promote CGS through public speaking, teaching at local libraries, showing our work and providing member brochures to all patches and instructors.

Betty Finch said there are significant cash prizes for the AGS Jim Story manipulated gourd competition. She explained the multi-year entry process, which has recently been updated to open up the competition more and was outlined on the AGS website. Another change is that the competition will be open to international entries. She talked about past gourd hat competitions and how this tradition started, and passed around photos. She suggested this activity be considered at the retreat and volunteered to organize it. Betty talked about her activities at the Heirloom Expo, where she passed out seeds and had a display about gourds with CGS and AGS website information. She suggested a multiple patch get together be organized, with an activity for work with damaged gourds ("holy gourds"). She offered to visit patches to talk about gourd manipulation and gourd hats or etching on gourds with coffee. She encouraged experimenting with other types of crafts, trying new tools, or observing how others work their craft. Sue G. showed a seed expo catalog with a picture of Betty and her sculptural gourd.

Golden Gourd Editor Report

Mary Bliss said 2016 Golden Gourd expense was \$2,400 for her contract and income was \$695. She said we may need to seek new advertisers to keep income at this level. She emailed the Constant Contact reports to the Board prior to the meeting, noting that we have a high rating of opened emails. She reviewed the communication emails that had been sent to members and the plan for Golden Gourd 2017 content and schedule. Board members volunteered to submit articles, tutorials or to follow up on ideas and get pictures to Mary.

Olive complimented Mary on the special issue on CGS members' participation at state and county fairs, and thought this issue would be good to have available at festivals or fairs. A letter was read complementing Mary on the quality of the newsletter and the hope that she continues to manage this important communication for CGS.

Creative Projects Chairperson Report

Sherry Hunga-Moore was thanked for accepting this position. She said that showing an example the totem fundraising project at the patch leader meeting helped sell the idea. She distributed a flier and sample ticket. We were not sure why the 2015/2016 wreath project proceeds were down from previous fundraisers (grossed \$1,133). The information about the current project is on the website, and she felt it was important to get tickets distributed and have the patch leaders get this rolling. Patches need to understand this is the ideal way to raise funds to support their leaders attendance at patch leader meetings (patches pay \$.50 and sell tickets for \$1). It was suggested we sell items such as aprons, luggage tags, window decals ("Gourds on Board" in yellow warning sign). Sherry said she will look into the decal idea.

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Website/Facebook Report

Mary showed the website that will be on the new server. She asked that suggested changes be sent to her. She said the new site has a store with an inventory feature, which may work more efficiently with a different merchant provider other than PayPal. Mary was authorized to transfer the CGS website to the new Squarespace platform at her discretion.

She reported that we have gotten quite a bit of interest on the CGS Facebook page. She said the gourd contest idea was not very successful. In order to increase traffic, she recommended we all invite our Facebook friends to the website. Mary was thanked for her many hours of work in support of CGS.

Competition Report

Debra Zimmerman was invited to attend this meeting, because she worked closely with Susan Sullivan and Jack Thorpe on the Southern CGS competition. Debra created detail notes to document the process of the joint competition with the Orange County Woodcarvers for future reference and will create a generic format for others to use for joint competitions and make it available on the CGS website. This pilot program had a limited number of categories and was a factor in the small number of entries, and she acknowledged Olive's help in gathering entries. Jack Thorpe was in charge of the judges and clerks and more volunteers were needed. Discussion followed on how categories are developed. Pam said she was working on gathering input and documenting the general competition process. Olive suggested there be discussion another time about the issue of entries that are class projects.

Olive said the Board needs to decide whether or not to hold a competition in the north at the Calabash gourd festival or at the new art festival indoor venue being sought by the Folsom group. Concerns that occurred in 2016 at the Calabash festival were discussed. Considering that the northern members that managed and ran the competition were not willing to do it in 2017 due to expenses incurred, a motion was carried to discontinue the CGS northern competition at the Calabash festival and approve proceeding with a competition at another location; and to hold a southern competition in cooperation with the Orange County Woodcarvers. The timing of these two competitions in the Fall would not conflict with each other. It was agreed that we would decide the funding support level for the northern competition facility during the budget discussion later today. It was clarified that the southern competition was not a festival and, except for collecting entry fees, it was not a revenue-generator with sales opportunities. Sherry said we should consider purchasing custom competition table cloths. A revenue and expense summary of the 2016 northern and southern competitions was distributed.

Mary said she would like to have all AGS trained judges listed on the website so that they can be accessed by anyone, even by out-of -state competitions.

Terms of Office

Olive said we didn't put a call for volunteers for Board positions last Fall. Discussion followed regarding processes to fill officer and board member positions. The current status of Board two-year positions are as follows: Olive Moore as President through January 2018, Pam Argo as Vice President through January 2018, Peggy Blessing as Secretary through January 2017, Sue Gouig as Director of Northern Programs through January 2018, Rosalie Gochnour as Treasurer through January 2018, Elaine Linton as Director of Southern Programs through January 2018, Susan Sullivan as Director at Large/Ambassador through January 2018, and JoAnn Clark as Vice President of Membership through January 2018. It was agreed that the office of Vice President, Secretary, Vice President of Membership and Director of Northern Programs be opened up for nomination the Fall of 2017; and to open up the other five positions for nomination in the Fall of 2018.

Bylaws

Pam said last year the Board spent four hours reviewing bylaw revisions that had been proposed to align with current practices and to streamline the wording. The document distributed prior to today's board meeting for review reflected input from last year's discussion. Pam acknowledged the countless hours that Sylvia spent on this project, and she felt this latest revision incorporated the comments and concerns that were expressed last year. She asked that comments or suggested changes be emailed to her within the next two weeks and asked board members to check their position duties to be sure it was accurate. It was noted that the new position Sherry assumed, Creative Projects Coordinator, was not a voting position and, therefore, should not be listed in Section 4 of the bylaws. It was suggested that the policies/ procedures and job descriptions be separated from the bylaws and not attached as an addendum, thus allowing changes from time-to-time without having to file these changes with the State of California. She said the revised bylaws could be approved electronically later in the year. It was noted that title changes were published prior to the approval of the revised bylaws.

New Business

<u>Internal Audit</u>: Olive said she was to appoint an internal audit committee in 2016 but hadn't done this yet. She asked for suggestions on the best way to support this effort. It was noted that the Treasurer and President cannot serve on this committee. The committee would be charged with developing the types of documents (e.g., bank statements, invoices) that should be reviewed and the processes and frequency for review. Committee member suggestions included asking Elaine, Gail Shell and Grace Swanson.

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<u>Travel Reimbursement:</u> It was clarified that only the northern and southern directors get reimbursed for travel expenses in connection with the patch leader meetings.

The meeting recessed at 5:15pm for dinner and budget meeting.

Following a budget development meeting that began at 7:40pm, the Board meeting reconvened at 9:10pm. A motion carried to approve the 2017 budget as proposed during the budget development meeting. The budget worksheet reflected \$9,226 income, \$12,747 expense and net income loss of (\$3,521).

The meeting adjourned at 9:12pm.

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



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
