2018 Retreat Hat Parade By Betty Finch

Some were wearing entire head-to toe costumes to match their hats. The San Diego group surprised everyone with their coordinated Mickey Mouse themed hats. The group even entertained everyone by singing the Mickey Mouse song causing the room to join in.



Host a Gourd Judges Training Session

The weekend started out with the patch's annual BBQ Picnic Saturday evening. Sylvia Nelson, an AGS certified judge training instructor, was invited to attend since the training session was the following morning and Sylvia traveled all the way down to Camarillo from Sacramento. Olive Moore, CGS President, also joined them. She would assist Sylvia in the training, which would qualify her to also be a certified judge training instructor.

Kathleen Johnston, Ventura County Gourd Artist's (VCGA) president, had made arrangements to use a class-room where she teaches regular community classes on gourds. It was perfect for the class. Attendees even brought left-overs from the picnic to munch on during class time.

Everyone was asked to bring some of their gourd art for mock judging. They were asked to bring good examples and not so good examples of different techniques. They ended up with a wonderful selection of gourds to work with from carved to woodburned to painted gourd art.

Sylvia began by sharing the guidelines and procedures from the American Gourd Society Judging Handbook, answering questions along the way. Different methods of judging were discussed along with the flexibility of each competition team holding a gourd competition. The Bay Area 2018 Competition Rules, Definitions and Categories were used as an example.

Then Olive reviewed the judging procedure for each technique as to what to look for, following the "Judging Guidelines by Category" and using scoring method Option A. There was much discussion during this process. The group plans to meet again to further discuss additional techniques and procedures.

All those who attended are now *Apprentice Judges*. To become a *Certified Judge* they will each need to maintain their AGS membership and either judge or clerk in a AGS sanctioned competition. In 2018 there are two opportunities: 1) Bay Area Gourd Competition at GourdFest, sponsored by the Calabash Club of Silicon Valley in San Martin and 2) Southern California Gourd Competition in conjunction with the Orange County Woodcarvers, sponsored by the Orange County Gourd Patch. Both events are in October. Details are listed on the CGS website.





Tips for Selling Gourds By Kathleen Johnston

Selling is about getting the customer to trust themselves enough to take action to buy an item and feel they made the right decision. Here are a few tips to ensure a successful transaction.

Venue

- 1. Know your audience. There is a big difference between a flea market, craft fair, art show and a wine festival. All venues attract different types of spending. At a flea market or craft fair people are of the mind set to spend less, looking for a bargain or something simple. At an art fair or wine festival, tastes may be a bit more refined, your audience is searching for that special something to decorate their home or a gift purchase. If the venue is family oriented, gear your gourds to the children. One will sell far more ghost and pumpkin gourds at a fall festival than bird houses and bowls. Same with holiday fairs. Have snowmen, ornaments and red and green gourds available. These items are impulse purchases and sell well. I find smaller ticket items, under \$15, are popular as well as profitable!
- 2. Be aware of the demographics. Disposable income is a variable. Price accordingly. A \$50 item may sell for \$30 in one area and \$75 in another.
- 3. Research recent trends. If you are at a family festival know what the current popular character is. Last year at our pumpkin patches, gourds with Jack Skellington on them flew off the tables.

Selling

- People always have questions about gourds: What are they, where do you get them, what can you do with them, etc. Display samples of before and after and describe the process. A little education goes a long way. Have a work in progress at your booth as people are naturally curious and want to know what you are doing. People then appreciate the amount of work that goes into a gourd and will tell others. This is an invitation into your world.
- When a potential customer is contemplating your work, tell them a little about the gourd, paint a picture for them. Suggest uses and benefits. Remind them that gourds are unique, one of a kind, cannot be bought in a store and last forever! Let the customer hold the gourd. Studies have shown that holding an item forms a bond and a sense of ownership within 30 seconds.
- Price the item right. Have selections of different prices to attract every budget.

Closing the Deal

- ◆ Offer a small gift with purchase a bag of seeds, small gourd, small gourd with a plant. Even a small dish made from a shard that can be used for soap, pins, small change, or candy dish is nice and is a good use for "spare parts." And, it's a conversation lead-in.
- People LOVE bargains and free stuff. Avon and Lancôme have been doing this for years.


- Price items individually, say \$5 each, but offer 3 for \$12. Be willing to bargain. If someone has \$50 to spend they may be happier with three to four items as opposed to one or two items. Psychologically they get more bang for their buck.
- Offer some popular gourds in different sizes.

Your Booth

- Your audience should see your booth and feel welcome to come in.
- Look at your space from the outside. Is it appealing?
- Put your name on the booth so people know who you are and will remember you.
- Never leave a booth empty. Have you ever entered a store or a booth and no one is there? Very uninviting and cold. A real turnoff.
- If attendance is slow, stage traffic in your space, even if you have to recruit friends and family to act like interested customers. Traffic encourages people to come in. They want to know what the attraction is. A crowd attracts a crowd. Have candy or dog biscuits on hand. If you give a treat to their child or their dog, in response, they will linger a little longer.

Closure

- Once a purchase is made, you still have an opportunity to leave a lasting impression.
- Thank the person.
- Make sure they leave happy and glad they stopped by your booth.
- Wrap the item in tissue and offer a bag. This adds that personal touch and shows you care. Drop in a business card or thank you note. This looks nice and travels well. Offer to hold the item.
- Ask them why they came and how they heard about us. You want the customer to remember the experience. They will tell others and become repeat buyers.
- If you are selling high price items, consider taking credit/debit cards. No one carries cash anymore!
- Tell people about our gourd clubs and events. Hand them your business card and ask them to contact you if they have any questions. I know of several gourders who have gotten future orders, commissions, referrals and requests this way.



A GOURD TIME WAS HAD BY ALL

The 2018 CGS Retreat was attended by 60 gourders from 11 area groups (Folsom Gourd Artists, Amador Gourd Artists, East Bay Gourd Patch, San Diego County Gourd Artists, Orange County Gourd Society, Ventura County Gourd Artists, Calabash Club of Silicon Valley, Rio Linda Gourd Artists, Bachelor Valley Gourd Club, Petaluma Gourd Artists, and Tulare/Sequoia Gourd Patch) from up and down the state. It started before the 2 o'clock registration on Thursday with the group of workers who willingly came up to set up on Wednesday night.

The ECCO Lodge facility was beautiful. It is located on 160 acres of forested land and sat back about a mile from Highway 41. The retreat center has hiking trails, comfortable rooms, great food, and a duck pond with a swan in residence. A massage therapist came on Thursday and Friday to pamper.

Throughout the Retreat I had a chance to chat with several of the attendees and learned so much about them, their experiences with gourds and their involvement in gourd groups. I'd like to share a few.

Pam Eckert who is new to CGS and gourds and is not a member of any patch YET said she was interested in knowing more about gourds because she volunteers at the Sunflower Hill Gardens which provides educational/vocational programs for special needs individuals from the Tri-Valley area. Currently she is planning multiple gourd projects to sell and raise money for the Garden. The Retreat is giving her lots of ideas. She believes doing gourd projects not only engages the "kids" but adds to their skills. Her son is a special needs individual with downs syndrome and she wants to find ways to help and support other special needs kids. She loves gardening and is hoping to grow gourds in the Sunflower Hill gardens as well as in her own garden.

For Marilyn Phelps (President of the Folsom Gourd Artists) and Gail Zimmerman (also in the Folsom group) it was their first retreat. They came because it sounded like so much fun and they wanted to meet other gourders from around the state. And they did. In fact, one of their favorite things was the camaraderie in the work area where people shared ideas, equipment and fun. Gail and Marilyn worked on several of the six projects made available to everyone in their project bag which we all received when we registered. Marilyn has been gourding about three years and is not sure what her favorite technique is, but she wants to try them all.

Elsie Cogswell and Charlene Smith became good friends because of gourds. They started in the Ventura group in 1999 when it was called the Channel Island Gourd Patch. Carol Rookstool was President. Elsie and Charlene have been President.



dent, Vice President and Treasurer of their group over the years. The Ventura group has about 65 members. They have won quite a few blue ribbons with their entries in the Ventura County Fair. Elsie and Charlene have collected their own blue ribbons since the start of their friendship. Their 20-year friendship started with gourds and now they travel together, go to retreats together and just enjoy each other's company.

Susan Sullivan (Leader of the Orange County Gourd Society and also CGS Directorat-large) got started in gourds because of her 7-year-old son (who is now in his 30's). She went to the nursery to get some plants for her yard and her grandson found a packet of gourd seeds with a birdhouse and a bluebird on the front of the package that he wanted to plant. While she was planting her new plants, he went around dropping seeds in the fresh soil. As his gourds started to grow they took over a large part of her

yard, but she couldn't bear to pull them because he was so excited. Susan ended up with about 30 gourds and she wondered what to do with them. She called Carol Rookstool who was busy forming the California Gourd Society and asked for advice. Carol gave her some ideas and suggested she find other people in her area who were interested. She did and started Orange County Gourd Society and has headed it up for 23 years. She started by putting an ad in the "Penny Saver". She held the first meeting in a Tandy Leather Shop and later in a craft store for several years. The Orange County Arboretum allowed the group to meet there and grow gourds. Susan's group also worked at the Orange County Fair for years with extensive educational information. Community outreach has always been one of their main goals. Susan had done more talks at garden clubs than she can count. Being president of the Orange County group has been fun, she has always enjoyed it. Susan has fond memories of her Kansas grandparents growing gourds on an overhead arbor to shade their fish pond and keep it cool. She doesn't remember what they did (if anything) with the gourds but it is still a great memory.



Christy Tsai, a member of the Calabash group, won the Hat Parade with a "Bird Nest" atop her head. Her husband, Ming, came with her and enjoyed the people, the food, and the surroundings while Christy played with gourds. Years ago, Christy's mom, who is also an artist, came for a visit from Taiwan and Christy signed them up for a gourd class taught by Ginger Summit. Her mother enjoyed the class and so did Christy who waited until she retired to continue doing gourds. There is traditional gourd art in Taiwan, but Christy says gourds are more creative here. She likes to share her talent. She has donated greeting cards from her water-color paintings of pet portraits to Saratoga Senior Center and New Hope Cancer Foundation for their fund raising. She has volunteered at the Cupertino Senior Center for over 11 years. She taught fabric painting at Tzu Chi Foundation senior program.
