Featured Artist – Cathy Agnew ^{By}

Growing up in Oklahoma as the oldest of eleven children there was little time for art, said Cathy Agnew, who now lives in Moorpark in Ventura County.

A self-proclaimed "Okie from Muskogee," Agnew is a member of the Ventura County Gourd Artists and an avid gourd artist. "I have worked ever since I was 12 or 13 - cleaning houses, working at a drive-in movie, babysitting. I didn't really do any artsy stuff," she said.

Not so today.

The 71-year-old is a prolific artist whose passion for gourds was sparked during a visit to the Tsa-La-Gi Museum, now known as the Cherokee Heritage Center in Oklahoma. Seeking information on her Native American heritage she's one-eighth Cherokee and able to trace her lineage to the Bird Clan and to before the 1830's Trail of Tears march. Agnew was intrigued by gourds on display.

Using the gourd as a personal art palette, however, didn't take shape for years.

She and her husband of 54 years, Wayne, moved to Southern California from the Midwest in 1988 when he took a job with Rockwell International, which later became Boeing. She, too, went to work for the company, retiring after 23 years to take care of her then 18-month-old grandson Nico, who had open-heart surgery. Later, when he was diagnosed with autism, Agnew took him to early childhood intervention programs. Today, he is a junior at Simi Valley High School.

Agnew's gourd art began in earnest when she saw a newspaper ad about a class at the Moorpark Active Adult Center. That was in 2003 and she's been taking classes at the center ever since.

Acrylics are her medium of choice, but the mother of two and grandmother of four also enjoys dabbling with alcohol inks. She's a whiz at coiling and has shared her skills in the Tuesday classes. She taught a luminaria class at the VCGA retreat last fall.

The artist's work reflects her love of working with bright and vivid colors, "but leaving the natural gourd as much as possible."

Her favorite theme remains Native American, although she admits having to diversify "because not everyone likes Native American art."

Agnew's home reflects her heritage and Wayne's (he's 1/16 Cherokee). In addition to myriad gourd creations she's made, there are pieces made by fellow club members whose artwork she admires. The walls are covered with her own pieces as well as original paintings and prints by the famous Cherokee artist Bill Rabbit.


The room and a nearby studio she shares with Wayne (a musician who "can play anything with strings") is a reflection of both of their interests. His recording equipment and instruments hobnob with her workbench. Oftentimes they work on their respective projects side-by-side.

"I support him in his music and he supports me in my art," Agnew said. "We have our individual skills, but we still do it together."

Aside from the Moorpark classes she's taken, Agnew has only taken a handful of classes taught by professional gourd artists, including Don Weeke and Olive Moore. She especially admires the creativity and techniques taught by fellow VCGA member Camille King, who recently introduced her to basket weaving on a gourd.

"The Cherokee were basket weavers which is why I'm interested in learning more," Agnew said.

Once a year Agnew turns her focus from serious art to the whimsical, creating hundreds of Halloween pieces for the annual Underwood Harvest Festival in Moorpark. Witches, scarecrows, skulls and pumpkins are popular themes and she's been known to return home sold out after day one and staying up until the wee hours painting more for the next day's booth.

As VCGA Outreach chair, Agnew is kept busy developing projects and coordinating volunteers to go to schools and to Arc and Ocean View Pavilion, organizations for mentally challenged adults.

"I like working with kids and special needs people," Agnew said. "So often you see them making things out of paper plates and cups - it's just stuff that is usually thrown away. I like the gourd projects because they have a finished product they can be proud of."

"We've done rabbits, cats and Halloween every way possible," she said laughing. But the participants have also made birdhouses, gourd planters filled with live flowers, clowns and more.

Other than the Ventura County Fair, she hasn't entered gourd competitions. She sells her art at the annual VCGA Gourd and Art Festival, this year April 21 in Santa Rosa Valley, and several times a year at state fiddle contests in Oroville and Tehachapi. On April 28-29 she will share a booth with Camille King at the Paso Robles Art in the Park.

When she's not working on gourds (and she has a small barnful) Agnew helps daughter Jodi Navarro of Simi, with Nico and granddaughter Catia, 14. Her other daughter, Wendy Sternberg, lives in Moorpark. Her other grandchildren, Rachel and Jordan, are grown.

Though she's not musically inclined, her involvement in Wayne's world is noteworthy. He was local and state president of the Old Time Fiddlers Association and she was chairman of the board for four years. She was also state OTFA director. In 2013, Wayne and several members broke from the group and formed the Old Time Country Bluegrass Gospel Music Association of which Agnew is treasurer, newsletter editor and "snack bar lady." She continues doing the Old Time Fiddlers newsletter, too!

What does the future look like for this busy lady?

Agnew says she'll continue to help with the grandkids as needed, will follow Wayne to his gigs, take the Tuesday gourd classes and be willing to pitch in whenever VCGA asks. And, she hopes to improve her gourd techniques.

"I'm not very good at wood burning and would like to learn to do fine detail," Agnew said. Also, "to learn Tole painting because it makes painting so much easier if you know the strokes, and one day paint portraits of my grandkids."

Tips & Tricks

It is time to start thinking about planting gourds, which includes selecting which varieties to plant, obtaining seeds, and adding compost to the planting site. If you live in an apartment in the city you may be able to grow a gourd in a large container if you have a patio that gets some direct sunlight. Half wine-barrels and old bathtubs make cute gourd gardens. When planting in containers smaller gourd varieties are recommended. You can train your gourd up a trellis or around fencing to form an attractive and interesting patio setting. Think of the fun you can have experimenting with manipulating your little gourds.

Here are some tips to starting seeds. For guick germination, lightly sand the shoulders of the gourd seed near the pointed tip. Soak the seed in lukewarm water overnight. Lightly dampen a paper towel wringing out any excess moisture so it is only slightly damp. Fold the paper towel until it will fit inside a ziplock bag. Insert the seed between layers and zip the bag shut. Place the ziplock bag on a heating pad, in a window, or inside an oven with the oven light on. The temperature should be close to 80 degrees for a period of 3 days. After 3 days check the seed every 4 hours for any sign of sprouting. If the pointed end of the seed has split open it has begun to sprout and cannot reverse. At this point the seed can be transplanted into soil. Don't wait! Within hours the seed will start sending out a root and the root will form hairs that may stick to the paper towel. Once the seed has reached this stage it is better to use scissors to cut around the root and plant a bit of the paper towel with the seed rather than to rip the seed from the paper towel and risk damaging the root hairs. The seedling must be protected from frost. Even a slight frost will kill a baby gourd. Cover the seedling with a washcloth at night if you expect the temperature to drop below 34 just to be safe.

Young gourds must be protected from nocturnal predators, snails, slugs and earwigs which can devour an entire 4-leaf gourd overnight. Squirting a circle of liquid "Deadline" snail and slug killer around your seedling will protect it from snails and slugs but protecting it from earwigs is more of a challenge. Earwigs can be drowned in a tuna-can with a quarter-inch of cooking oil and a drop of soy sauce. If you have chickens they will enjoy eating the oil-covered earwigs. If you have cats or dogs that will lick the oil out of the traps you can use empty wine bottles lying on their sides instead of tuna cans, or stuff cardboard boxes with damp newspa-

pers to create earwig hotels and then burn the box or shake the earwigs out of it inside a chicken coop. It is a good idea to test the area you are going to plant your gourd in with an earwig trap before you plant your gourd. If you trap an abundance of earwigs you should transplant your gourd into a container and keep it in a sunny window until it has at least 4 leaves and keep trapping earwigs until their numbers are reduced. As the gourd gets older and tougher snails and earwigs do less damage but for the first 2 weeks baby gourds are vulnerable and can be wiped out overnight.

Hat Parades by Betty Finch

Hat parades have been a popular item at gourd festivals east of the Mississippi for decades and they are beginning to gain popularity in the West. For those of you who will be attending the August 2018 CGS retreat in Oakhurst, here is what to anticipate for the hat parade. Special ribbons will be awarded in 6 categories: Most original, most beautiful, most interesting, gourdiest, funniest, and other special recognition. From this group of 6, the overall winner will be determined by spectator applause. <u>A \$100 prize will be awarded to the overall</u> <u>most popular winner!</u>

Photos of the winners will be forwarded to The Gourd Magazine for possible publication and to be included in a new national Jim Story Hat Competition.

A little history on the American Gourd Society (AGS) hat parades. The late Jim Story was well known in the American Gourd Society for many things. He was the undisputed national champion at manipulating gourds, having mastered many knot-tying and twisting techniques.

Jim was famous for freely sharing his knowledge and for encouraging others to share what they had learned from him. Jim did not sell his gourds but he gave them away to be auctioned off to raise funds for state AGS chapters and he gifted his unique gourds to people who appreciated them. Jim encouraged and challenged gourd artists and growers alike to continue to push the envelope and come up with new ideas.

An area Jim Story took particular interest in was the wearing of gourd apparel. Well in advance of gourd festivals he would type personal letters to individuals urging them to make and wear gourd jewelry and hats. In response, many regulars began wearing a signature gourd hat and or necklace to festivals. Eventually it became a tradition to hold hat parades. Experienced festival attendees would wear their signature hat during the festival and make a new hat each year for the parade. The seemingly spontaneous hat parades were conducted during the gathering of the largest number of festival attendees, often at the close of a meal. Jim would go to the front of the room and call for everyone wearing gourd apparel to come to the front of the room. Old timers kept their competition hats hidden until this moment. Suddenly out from under tables and from brown paper bags new hats would appear. Many were very comical resulting in much laughter and a

scrambling for cameras. Jim would line the contestants up and one at a time he would raise his arm indicating which contestant was being considered as the crowd applauded. The one generating the most applause was declared the winner and given a gift, (an item donated by a vendor). If there were too many contestants to fit at the front of the room Jim would simply instruct them to circle the room giving spectators an opportunity to see the hats close-up and take photographs while he and other judges conferred to narrow down the field of finalists to a manageable number. As the popularity of the much-anticipated event grew, Jim began dividing the competition into Necklaces and other Gourd Apparel, Children's Hats, Men's Hats and Women's Hats.

To commemorate Jim Story, beginning in 2018 the AGS will award an annual certificate to the top gourd hat from submitted photographs. Watch for more information on this in the upcoming issue of "The Gourd Magazine".


