
















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President's Message

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Eloquent Elegance of Pat Boyd

Tatricia Boyd is a Pasadena born artist who came to work with gourds only three years ago. After Pat's sister took a gourd class and began her own journey into gourds, Pat, her sister and their mother took a trip to Africa, Of African-American descent, Pat felt the sights of her ancestral homeland speaking deeply to her. Seeing gourds in daily use, Pat returned home to unleash her creativity upon them. The emotional impact of her

character sculptures is profound. "I like to make the pieces reach out, grab you and tell you a story." Looking at these photos reveals that Pat has easily reached that goal.

These are not gourds, these are people carrying on their rich and infinitely variable existences.

The depth of personality, the sense of connection and the integral cultural detail of Pat's work is so uncommon as to permeate a viewer's thought patterns for some time. "The story" continues to be told even though the viewer moves on. The fine detail in these figures reveals Pat's passion previously expressed in jewelry. A serene sense of destiny surrounds the characters. These are not gourds, these are people carrying on their rich and infinitely variable existences. But these are gourds and they speak of the people they represent so eloquently as to belie the humble source of their forms.

You can see more of Pat's work at the Welburn Gourd Festival in Fallbrook, The Folk Tree Gallery in Pasadena, The Tree Mover's Tree and Gourd Farm in Palmdale.

n Ohio, for the Gourd Festival, I had In Ohio, for the Ooute Form, the privilege of meeting Honey Bear Miller and his missus, Mary. An avid reader of gourd publications, I had often read articles by or about Honey Bear and his gourds. Imagine my delight one morning at the famed "Hat Breakfast" (a competitive event for those who make and wear gourd hats) when I found that my charming table mates were none other than Mr. and Mrs. Honey Bear Miller.

We had spent the previous 1/2 hour chatting about gourds and looking at photos of beautiful gourds from this charming gentleman's garden while we ate breakfast. A "gourd princess" came around to collect names for door prizes and before my table mate dropped his name into the hat he asked me to read it. A collection of symbols I recognized as the Cherokee syllabary (phonemes instead of alphabet) encrypted something I could not read. "Can you read that?" he asked. "Nope!" I confessed, but I see it's Cherokee. "Well it is Cherokee and it says 'Honey Bear'!" he proudly claimed. It was then I realized we had not introduced ourselves and I found my companions to be veritable gourd legends!

We spent the next hour gabbing away until I was asked to fill in for a missing judge. Honored

to say the least, I hesitated only a moment before acquiescing. As I was scrutinized by the other two judges (hmmmm, purple hair, weird jewelry, some other kind of clothes) I could see the looks passing between them and there was a veritable hum in the air. "You're not from around here, are you?" My response, "No, I'm from the

California Group", was met by knowing head nods. "I thought so", confided one of the ladies. "Have you judged before?" queried the other, "Do you know what we're attempting to do here?" Very serious questions about rating a parade of people wearing the most extraordinary pieces of head gear ever seen! I began to get a little nervous. "What are the criteria?" I asked as I saw hats that looked like Victorian birdcages with flowers, pumpkins with leaves and even a gourd baseball cap (worn by a princess in a fairy tale ballroom dress). "There are

Make Way for Alex Villilva!!

Twant to tell everyone about a remarkable gourd crafter, Alex Villilva. I met Alex two years ago at the first Kern County Gourd Patch meeting when Alex presented me with a beautifully decorated dipper gourd for having organized the meeting. Alex, a tall Native American who wears his long black hair neatly braided is fluent in three languages. He carries himself with command presence and quiet dignity.

Alex has been crafting gourds for 3 years. There is a striking quality about his gourd crafting though he has never had an art class. One unique thing about his work is the symbolic meaning in the artwork. His gourds each tell a detailed story. Many depict his early memories of the stories his Navajo mother told him.

Alex's maternal grandfather was a buffalo soldier who fought in the Civil War. Alex recalls as a kid he was beat up by the white kids and black kids because he could not speak English and he was beat up by the Mexican kids because he could not speak Spanish. All he could speak was the Native American language of his father, Pima.

His father made his living by playing the guitar. When Alex was 11 his mother died and his 70-year old father was unable to care for him. As a result Alex became an alcoholic by the age of 12.

Alex never learned to read but he was given a special education GED just to get him out of the school. Then he was drafted. Alex recalls being told he would be sent to Levenworth Prison because he could not read some military forms that he was required to complete. Friends helped him complete the forms and he was shipped to Viet Nam. In Viet Nam Alex became a drug addict. During combat Alex was shot 5 times in the back and once in the leg. He was awarded a Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and numerous other medals.

His first marriage lasted only a year because of his drug addition. While married to his second wife he conquered his drug addiction but his wife was unable to cope with his drinking and nightmares about Viet Nam and divorced



him. After 11 years his third wife left him because his nightmares terrified her.

Alex quit drinking 10 years ago. He still has nightmares but finds that attending and participating in sweat lodges and Powwows helps a lot. Getting into Native American spiritual work makes him happy. Alex enjoys woodburning spiritual things on gourds.

Last Spring I was honored when Alex invited me to participate in a gourd dance at the Standing Bear Pow wow where he was the head gourd dancer. I didn't know anything about gourd dancing and in retrospect was afraid I may have embarrassed Alex with my blunders. Let me share with you what I learned from the exhilarating experience.

When an open invitation is given to join the gourd dance, a blanket is laid on the ground next to some elders. Participants from the crowd run to the center to join the dance. Women participants should throw a shawl over their shoulders as they enter. Participants inconspicuously drop a folded bill on the blanket as they approach the elders and acknowledge them and the gourd dancers in a reception line. Dancers then find a place to stand behind their favorite gourd dancer and join in the rhythmic movement to the drums and gourd rattles. The beat intensifies periodically calling for participants to repeatedly raise up high on their toes. At the conclusion the elders fold the blanket and carry it away. Never photograph a gourd dancer while they are on the Powwow grounds.

Alex entered some of his gourds in the Kern County Fair. I was not surprised





when Alex swept the category winning first, second and third. As he was picking up his entries at the close of the fair a small crowd of admirers gathered to compliment his work. I pointed out my favorite and Alex explained the meaning, "This is the Corn Maiden in the pollen ceremony. They are going to bless the fields with white corn meal for the spirits and yellow corn meal for mother earth. Her face is white for purity and his hair is long for strength. The lightening design on his blanket is to bring rain.' Alex handed the gourd to

me and said, "It is yours." I was so awestruck I could not speak. A man came rushing up to Alex with his wallet in his hand. He emptied the walled and thrust a fistful of bills toward Alex saying, "I want to buy one of your gourds. I'd like that one." He said, pointing to the gourd Alex had just handed me. "It is hers.", was Alex's reply. The man did not go away disappointed. He followed Alex to his car and returned with a satisfied grin and a large woodburned gourd depicting "Grandfather".

Alex says his gourd art has been influenced by three women. Nancy Clark, who was the start of his inspiration, Mariam Porter, of Camareo who bought him tools and gourds to get started, and surprisingly, me (Betty Finch). Alex tells me I showed him how to treat the gourds with a soft and gentle touch.

Alex enjoys traveling and spends much of his time traveling between his home in Lamont, California and his daughter's home in Arizona.

Alex is an inspiration to me with his natural talent, generosity and love for gourds. His work is already sought after locally and I predict his gourds will become a valuable collector's item. I regularly give Alex a speech about how he isn't charging enough for his work so keep that in mind.



PINE NEEDLES & REDWOOD CONES ON GOURDS - Mary Pryor – Learn pine needle coiling and add natural embellishments of imbedded cones between the coils. You'll start with a prepared 5"-6" gourd and end up with a personal treasure.



WOVEN PINE NEEDLE MAGIC - Toni Best – Weave rows of pine needles around the rim of gourd. Then go back and couch another row of pine needles over the first rows. Your finished gourd is a real tribute to the pine tree of the sky and the gourd of the earth.



BEACH COMBER NECKLACE - Lynne Everett – Learn the ancient technique of knotless netting and use it to encase shells, seaweed, driftwood or other gathered treasures, in a mini-gourd nest. Carry your treasures away with you in a piece of wearable gourd art.



FABULOUS COLOR - Stefan Schneider (AKA Gourdo of Gourdo & the Gourdettes) – You will learn color and finish techniques that will amaze you. This class was a big hit last year so sign up early.



FLASH & FUNK - Leigh Adams – Create a basket that can stand-alone or hang on the wall. The basket will feature fused glass inclusions, dye, and woodburning and may be embellished with coiled inflorescences around the rim.



PORCH POSY DECOUPAGE - D.J. Hermansen – No green thumb required to create this indoor or outdoor decorative piece. Decoupage colored tissue and decorative floral napkins onto a gourd and coat with polymer spray to protect your creation.

HANGING GOURD VESSEL - Jill Walker — Finally, use those rounded gourds that just won't stand up. Create a hanging gourd vessel suitable for a fruit bowl or planter. Students will decorate gourd with wood burning, dying and/or painting. Jute hanging cords will be embellished with gourd shards and beads to complete the design.

The instructor will guide you through various construction techniques that will let your spirit soar. • Any individual may enter, but must be a member of the California Gourd Society.

• Participants may enter only one entry per category and in only one division.

• There are 2 divisions: The Beginning Division for the novice and The Advanced Division for anyone that has won a ribbon in CGS past competitions.

• Entry fee will be \$5.00 for each competition category entered.

- All work must be done by the exhibiting artist and not previously entered in CGS competition before.
- Deadlines: Entries that are mailed in must be postmarked no later than Monday, June 18th, 2001. If personally delivered no later than Saturday, June 23rd, 2001 at 8:00 am.

• Judging will be Saturday, June 23rd, 2001 at 11:00 am.

• All participants agree to allow photographs to be taken of displayed items.

• Pick up will be Sunday, June 24th, 2001 from 3:00 pm to 5:00 pm. Entries may not be removed any earlier.

- Mailed entries will be returned in approximately two weeks after the show. Mailed entries must have return postage and shipping container to be returned.
- All artwork not picked up at the end of the exhibit on Sunday, June 24th, 2001 will be donated to CGS.

• California Gourd Society will officiate at all judging.

• Ribbons will be awarded for First, Second and Third place in each category. There will be a Best of Show Ribbon. Judges reserve the right to award any Honorable Mention ribbons.

CATEGORIES: GOURD MUST PREDOMINATE

1. Pyrography: Whole or cut gourd. Wood burned only – natural or clear finish allowed.

- **2. Carving/Cutting:** Whole or cut gourd. Cutting and or carving should be featured. May use carving tools, Dremel, saws etc. Gourd may be colored in any medium.
- 3. Multiple Embellishment Container: Must be a cut gourd with a lid using four or more of any techniques example: paper-mache, decoupage, acrylic paint, dye, pyrography, metal, carving, weaving, mosaic, etc. Finished piece must have embellishments.

4. Functional Items: Whole or cut gourd any media. Must be both decorated and functional ready to be used.

- **5. Mask:** Whole or cut gourd(s). May use any media. Embellishments like feathers, sticks, beads, etc. are allowed. Must have a hanger or attachment to allow the mask to be displayed on the wall.
- **6. Musical Instruments:** Whole or cut gourd(s). May use any media with additional materials to make the piece. Judges must be able to play the instrument.
- 7. Weaving/Coiling with Natural Fibers Only: Cut gourd with any technique of weaving or coiling. May use any natural fiber or waxed linen for your stitching. Gourd may be colored using any media.
- 8. Weaving with Man Made Materials: Cut gourd may be colored. Weaving may be done with any man made materials. Examples: wire, metals, beads, or anything man made.

9. Story Gourd: Whole or cut gourd any medium. Gourd must start and end with a story.

10. Garden Art: Whole or cut gourd(s). Any medium may be used. This piece of art would be something you would embellish your garden with. Example: Birdhouse, feeders, wind chimes, etc.

11. Fountains: Whole or cut gourd(s). Any medium may be used. We will be unable to accept mailed entries in this category.

12. Rhythm & Flow: This gourd will be a self-interpretation of the two words: Rhythm & Flow. This category is a challenge category to represent the design principle of "rhythm". Interpret this word/principle in a piece of gourd art. Any medium may be used. No restrictions on this category. Use your imagination!

13. Whimsy: This is an open category. No restrictions!

Jewelry has been broken into 3 categories:

Whole or cut gourd & or pieces. Any technique is allowed with any medium.

May use additional materials to finish embellishing your piece.

- 14. Gourd Necklace
- 15. Gourd Pin
- 16. Gourd Earrings

17. Purse: Cut gourd with any technique may use any media.

18. Dolls & Human Figures: Single or multiple gourds may be used. Doll may be applied onto a whole gourd surface by pyrography, paint, clay, etc. may use one or more of these techniques. Small amounts of additional materials will be allowed.

19. Animals & Other Creatures: Single or multiple gourds. May use any medium with any technique.

20. Carving/Cutting: Whole or cut gourd. Cutting and or carving should be featured. May use carving tools, Dremel, saws etc. Gourd may be colored in any medium.

We hope there is a category for each of you that wish to enter in the Competition this up coming year. Some of the categories have restrictions and need to have all the elements that are listed in that category. There are 12 new categories this year and some you can use your imagination. There are other categories that have no restrictions. We hope to see all of you at competition 2001 with some new techniques and mediums used in your art.
