Trans-Pacific Gourd Pollination Continues by Jill Walker

Betty Finch and I recently continued the gourd culture exchange between the California and American Gourd Societies and the Chinese Gourd Society. We made a visit to China in August of 2005 in order to attend the Gourd Island International Gourd Cultural Festival in Huludao, China. What a treat awaited us! The opening ceremony of the festival was worthy of opening the Summer Olympics with ten or more acts each involving 100 plus dancers, singers and/or musicians. The launch of large, colorful balloons and a bevy of dragon kites floating over the Gourd Island festival grounds preceded opening ceremonies.

Gourds were in evidence everywhere. A long promenade outside the cottage where we stayed was actually an arbor of growing gourds. A walk through the farm/garden area revealed that all gourds and squash were grown on arbors outside as well as in the greenhouses.

The gourd show was a true testament to the outstanding wood burning skills of the Chinese gourd artists. The classic bottle-shaped gourd with the stem intact is the favored gourd for most artists. Classical motifs of animals and Chinese mythological characters are frequent subjects but we are beginning to see some evidence of the "cross-pollination" of subjects and techniques, which has resulted from American influences. Some of the techniques we observed were carving, deeper wood burning to cause relief, cutting and re-assembling pieces, decoupage, and the use of polymer clay. Artists are also experimenting with the use of colored pencils and a variety of paints.

The opportunity to meet with Chinese artists and share their enthusiasm for gourds was very gratifying. We took gourd charts, books, posters, a CD slide show and small examples of gourd work. Excited gourders clustered around our booth to watch the slide show and look at our materials. Since we left all our materials with Mr. Pan Dongbo, presidents of the Gourd Island (Huludao) Gourd Society we hope that many gourders in China will have the opportunity to use them.

Another high point of our 10-day trip was traveling to Tianjin to visit the farm of master gourd molder, Mr. Zhang Cairi. There was obviously a great deal of preparation for our visit. We were treated to demonstrations of all aspects of the gourd molding process. We observed carving of the mold image, pouring of plaster molds, gourds growing in one-piece molds, removal of the mold from mature gourds, wood burning on molded gourds and "jade" knife carving of molded gourds. As if this carefully planned event was not enough Mr. Zhang also presented us each with a beautifully molded and wood burned cricket cage, which we will treasure for years to come.

China is an amazing country in the throes of vast modernization efforts. We had many new and interesting cultural encounters as we traveled about but we were comforted to find that gourders are the same the world over. Even though we spoke not one word of Chinese, we communicated in "gourdese" and felt an instant affinity with our Asian counterparts. We look forward to continuing the cultivation of trans-Pacific gourd pollination and will long cherish our new Chinese gourd friends who made our trip so memorable.

MYTHOLOGICAL MUSINGS BY DEBORAH EASLEY

"I saw my first gourd, and I was hooked!" "Gourds changed my life." "It's hard not to love a gourd."

Gourd lovers and gourd artists agree universally with these statements. But why? Why are we so entranced, so magnetized by these unique jewels from the earth that mysteriously burst forth in every corner of our planet.

One version of this journey into the 'why' of the gourd phenomenon oddly begins with our birth, the simultaneous separation from our mother and the Great Mother who metaphorically represents the whole or collective unconscious archetype. Whether healthy or unhealthy separation, we spend the rest of our lives unconsciously trying to reunite with that primary relationship.

The gourd shape represents that very return to the mother. The womb, the cave, the earth, and the void of teeming emptiness from which everything emerges; gourds represent a return to that wholeness we left. The shape triggers a feeling of the unity of all opposites—heaven and earth—above and below, an at-one-ness of psyche/spirit. It reminds us of our inherent need to return, reclaim, and recapture our primordial and original "feminine" from which we have become so estranged. What more perfect symbol to represent this journey than the gourd? Its body is the feminine shape—the gourd *is* the cellular structure of Gaia herself.

The process of a woman differentiating and separating from her mother is often difficult because mother is the *same* as herself. What conflict in co-creating this schism! Perhaps we women (and men) gourd artists are merely acting out our desire to re-merge with the good mother; or in the case of those who have rejected their mothers, perhaps we are trying to heal the wound that split us apart by focusing intently on the gourd.

We cannot speak of gourds without entering the realms of magic and mythology. In the mother-daughter myth of Demeter (Goddess of the Earth) and Persephone (Demeter's daughter and also a younger version of Demeter herself), Persephone is kidnapped by Hades to rule the underworld as his queen. Distraught by this great loss, Demeter begins a long, protracted journey seeking to reunite with her daughter. Zeus, tiring of Demeter's depression, sends Hermes to the underworld to retrieve Persephone. Persephone and Demeter reunite, but only for six months a year. Hades tricked Persephone into eating pomegranate seeds, and so she is compelled to return to the underworld once a year for six months to rule beside Hades. On one level, this is the Greek explanation for the seasons. When Persephone is in Hades, the land is barren; when reunited with mother Demeter, vegetation abounds. But the story goes deeper--as deep as Hermes traveled to rescue Persephone. In this myth, the bridge or link between the divided feminine (one aspect trapped above in the conscious light and one aspect trapped below in the unconscious dark) is the pomegranate. Demeter, the mother and Goddess of the Earth, resides in the light. She is the guardian of the darkness (represented by daughter Persephone) and gardener of the spirit. The pomegranate is the soul of the earth that contains seeds in darkness, which becomes fruit in the light. Always interconnected and interdependent, one cannot exist without the other. Persephone must make her journey from above to below and back again, beyond eternity.

And the original question: Why is the gourd such a compelling shape and form? It is our pomegranate, the archetype of the soul, and a symbol of bringing to consciousness our right to claim our wholeness. The deepest responsibility of the artist, whether sculptor, painter, dancer, or musician is to help us to see this consciousness; to point the way to experience what we've been missing—the self-recognition of the integral Whole.

Deborah Easley is a dancer, painter, gourd artist and copyeditor living in Crestone, Colorado. Her gourd art is currently on exhibit at Cichon Fine Art Gallery, Taos, NM. Have you ever tired of scrubbing and scraping your gourds? Well, try this proven method for delightful results....and yes, it does give a slightly blonde finish! Hydrogen peroxide is used in mild (1 and 2%) solutions for antiseptic purposes. At higher percentages, it is used to clean organic messes such as fouled stock cars, zoo bedding areas and stables or kennels. At even higher percentages, it is used to clean clogged plumbing lines and becomes a Hazmat material. We have found, through extensive experimentation, that hydrogen peroxide cleans the outside and inside of gourds very easily and with a minimum of trouble if you have a good set up. The gourds benefit from the least amount of exposure that will still give you results. The first time you successfully clean 25 Nigerian hard-shell minis in 15 minutes or a 12" bottle gourd, inside and out, in under 10 minutes, you'll be hooked! Please read and follow directions CAREFULLY! Let us know how you like the process and your experiences. And a special THANK YOU to all the people who tested this for us!

Tools: Large canning or tamale pot, stove or gas burner (if you want to work outdoors), tongs (barbeque tools are great), colander or draining device, gloves and eye protection. Materials: 2 gallons of hydrogen peroxide (eight quarts), a dirty gourd or two, a gourd with the opening cut into it.

Empty the peroxide into the large pot and put on the stove to reduce. Use your kitchen ventilator fan or have good

ventilation. As the liquid reduces, be aware that it becomes more caustic and can irritate skin. Use gloves or long handled tools. When the peroxide has reduced from two gallons to two quarts, it is four times stronger than the original concentration. While the liquid is simmering, lower the gourd carefully into the peroxide solution. Hold it down (with a tool) to achieve maximum immersion for at least two minutes, longer if the gourd is heavily moldy or a specialty like a warty or a maranka. All surfaces of the gourd need to be in the liquid. Carefully scrape the surface of the gourd. If the mold releases with NO resistance, remove the gourd, let it drain and rinse it clean. If the surface still clings tenaciously, cook it some more. Do NOT over cook! But, experimentation will bring you excellent results. Perhaps you'll need more fluid and a stronger solution, perhaps more time will do it. Each gourd is different and each gourd artist is different. Let us know what works for you!

Do experiment with cutting open a gourd and shaking out the seeds, putting it into the solution and cleaning the inside at the same time as the outside is cleaned. Be sure to pour the excess liquid back into the pot. It can be strained and used over and over again. When the gourd has cooled, perhaps under the faucet as you wash the loosened mold away, use a large spoon to scrape the interior clean. Mind you, this won't be scraping as you've done it before! The innards of the gourd (if it has simmered long enough) will come out easier than applesauce from a jar.


